\$2.50, and thereafter repeatedly asking for
it, after promise to pay had been repeatedly
broken, received nothing. One item in said
account, amounting to \$15 for one week's work,
after affiant's first sickness was sought to be
stricken out. affiant performed said week's
work but gives credit for it and on the ac-
count marked disputed. (Subsequent accounts
will show how it was decided.) After exhausting
all patience affiant was compelled, on the
9th day of October, 1893, to see the said D. O. Mc Car-
thy for the amount due him, \$60.50. Some time
before commencing suit, affiant gave an order

That in McCarthy's defense (both McCarthy's
having been sued) they introduced in evidence
a purported bill of sale reciting that the said
D. O. McCarthy, for the consideration of \$700 had
sold to his son, J. Harvey McCarthy, the entire
newspaper business and the plant used in
printing and publishing the "Vindicator". This was
a sham, the first evidence known to the
mortgagee of the material that such a transfer
had been made, although report had it that the
paper had been sold by McCarthy to his son. The
law in the matter was debated up and it was
found that the said McCarthy acted unlawfully
in making said transfer. That the transfer
made was dated April 19th 1893, 50 days after
the passage of an act by the last Legislature
making such transfers, without first giving
notice in writing to the mortgagee, larceny.
Appellant took advantage of these proceedings.
But will first say that in order ^{before execution} to
sue against McCarthy, appellant assigned
his judgment to his mother, who holds the
mortgage over McCarthy, in order that she

might attach the plant by her own consent, which was done.

1st. For reason of said Mc Carthy having made a fraudulent transfer to his son in order to defraud this affiant.

2^d. For reason that said Mc Carthy did commit larceny by so doing.

11th. That said Mc Carthy, in spite of advice given him by his attorney ^{to pay the bill}, is doing all in his power to defraud and delay this affiant in procuring his money.

That said Mc Carthy appealed the case rather than pay this just debt.

That suit was commenced by said D. O. Mc Carthy against the constable who levied on the plant for \$1000 claimed as damages. Said suit now being before the Supreme Court.

12th. Section 538, Amend. P. C. C., for 1893, Page 120 will settle the case against Mc Carthy, and show that larceny was committed and that the transfer was made to defraud creditors.

13th. By the treatment above sworn to affiant claims that he has for his goodness been greatly wronged by D. O. Mc Carthy and son, and ask the consideration of all sensible people, particularly working people. Asks that such a short and such a man be no longer tolerated in this community, and the sooner gotten rid of the better off will people who work for him be.

1st. That one D. O. Mc Carthy, of the City,
County and State aforesaid, on or about
1st day of July 1892, approached affiant
as to whether or not he could purchase a
lot of printing material, as he the said D.
O. Mc Carthy, proposed to publish a weekly
paper in the City of San Diego, California.
Affiant, (in order that he might obtain em-
ployment,) arranged, for said D. O. Mc Carthy
with one Anna E. Whaley, to the effect that
said Anna E. Whaley sold to said D. O. Mc
Carthy, a certain lot of printing material, for
the sum of \$1,000, secured by mortgage, for
1 year with interest at 10% per annum.
And so the said D. O. Mc Carthy became in
possession of the plant by which he is en-
abled to publish the "San Diego Vidette", through
the assistance of said affiant. That said
Mc Carthy has had possession of the plant
for over one year and upon the same has
only paid the sum of \$200 with interest. That
said Mc Carthy agreed that said affiant
should remain in his employ ^{from the date of having possession of plant}, until the said
mortgage should be satisfied. That said D.
O. Mc Carthy has violated his agreement with
said affiant, which the following testimony
will show:

by patience and perseverance he might obtain
the money due him, and at this time the
affiant was taken sick with rheumatism,
caused by the unhealthfulness of the base-
ment in which he required the affiant to
work, and made unhealthful for reasons
of the said D. O. McCarthy not keeping the
place warm and comfortable when there was
a stove in the office by which he could do
so. Two months previous to said middle
of December, affiant often times asked that
the stove be set up, and promise after prom-
ise that it would be done were broken, until
the basement, with cement floor, became so cold
and unbearable that finally the stove was set
up. Fully two weeks passed before wood was

1st That he is well acquainted with ^{the said}

that he has had business relations with the
said D. O. McCarthy, while in the latter's em-
ploy on the "San Diego Herald", a paper
owned and published by the said D. O. Mc-
Carthy, in the City of San Diego.

2^d That at the time of the first appear-
ance of said paper, or a little time prior to
the appearance of said paper, said D. O. Mc-
Carthy requested of said Francis M. Whaley
that he should enter his employ, taking
the position of foreman of said paper. In
order that assistance might be rendered the
said D. O. McCarthy, in the publication of
his paper, the said Whaley agreed to work for
him at a salary of \$15 per week, \$3 a week
less than is usually paid printers, and in
addition thereto, at said McCarthy's request,
said Whaley agreed to allow McCarthy to
retain from his wages, weekly, the sum of
\$5, in order to further assist the paper
financially.

3^d That said Whaley entered upon

the duties of foreman, on or about July 15th 1893. That said Whaley, in order to further assist in the publication of the said "Dan Diego Videtta", donated at two times to the said D. O. Mc Carthy, for several months, performing his duties as foreman of the office to the full and entire satisfaction of the said D. O. Mc Carthy.

That relative to the payment to him of his wages, the said Whaley states as follows:

That all went well for the first month or so, but that thereafter the most shameful of treatment to him followed. That having worked hard day in and day out, week in and week out, the monies paid to him were small, sometimes on Saturday evening receiving nothing at all, promises of payment on the following Monday, which promises were often broken, and even again and again on following Saturdays receiving nothing, and so it continued until the said D. O. Mc Carthy became deputy in chief to him.

That often it had occurred that when said Whaley was in need of money particularly to eat with, he would ask the said D. O. Mc Carthy or his son for it, with the answer that they did not have it, and so, often, while in the said Mc Carthy's employ, did the said Whaley

go Denny, because he could not obtain money due him. And after, upon promise to be paid money affiant did run in debt, promising upon the promises made him that the debts would be paid accordingly. The McCarthy's promises were so violated as to cause affiant to violate his word of honor and thus a great injury has been done him, after being compelled to take abuse from creditors for which he was not responsible. That affiant has been placed in other very awkward positions by reason of the little care taken by the McCarthy's to see that he was provided with sufficient money from the wages due him. That to obtain money from the said McCarthy was like pulling teeth, and when this affiant well knew that he had money in his possession, demand was made upon him, ^{for his account} but such demands were always dis honored.

7th That said D. O. McCarthy would. I affiant would not believe under any condition whatsoever, and that said affiant believes the said D. O. McCarthy's word and promises to be of no more account than a stray feather in a gale of wind. That said McCarthy merely promises in order to carry out his own devilish games and schemes.

8th That up to about the middle of December, 1892, the said affiant faithfully served the said D. O. McCarthy, as his foreman, suffering the above outrages upon him in the hope that
