RULES GOVERNING TABARD INN LIBRARY SERVICE.

LIBRARY MEMBERSHIP.—A LIFE MEMBERSHIP in The Tabard Inn Library consists in the permanent ownership of an exchangeable book in a Tabard Inn cloth case which carries with it the privilege of being exchangeable at any Library Station in the United States, Canada or Great Britain at the usual current exchange rates. The price of this is \$1.50.

THE EXCHANGE FEES.—Five Cents a week is the exchange fee charged, with an additional charge of One Cent a day for each day over the week a book is kept out, the maximum charge being Twenty-five Cents. Members agree to exchange their books at least four times a month or pay the equivalent.

TO TEMPORARILY DISCONTINUE THE SERVICE.

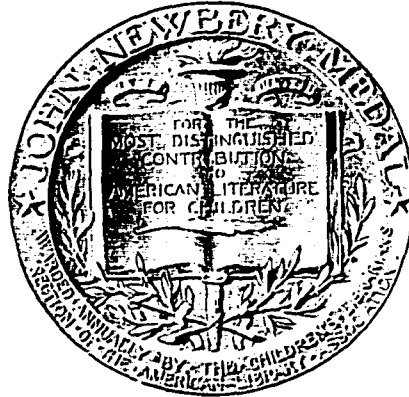
If you should desire to discontinue the use of the Library for a time, you may turn in your book and get an out-of-service book check for it. This check may be exchanged for a book at any time at any Tabard Inn Library station.

If you should lose your book, simply buy another and your membership continues.
