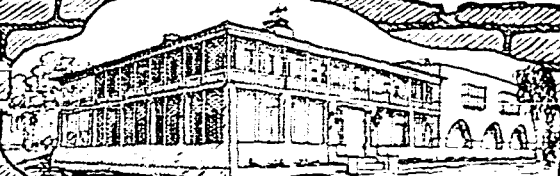

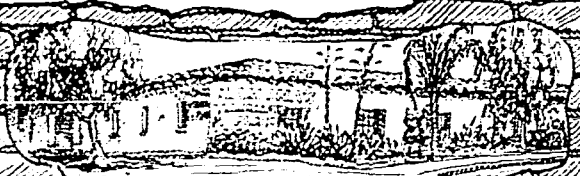

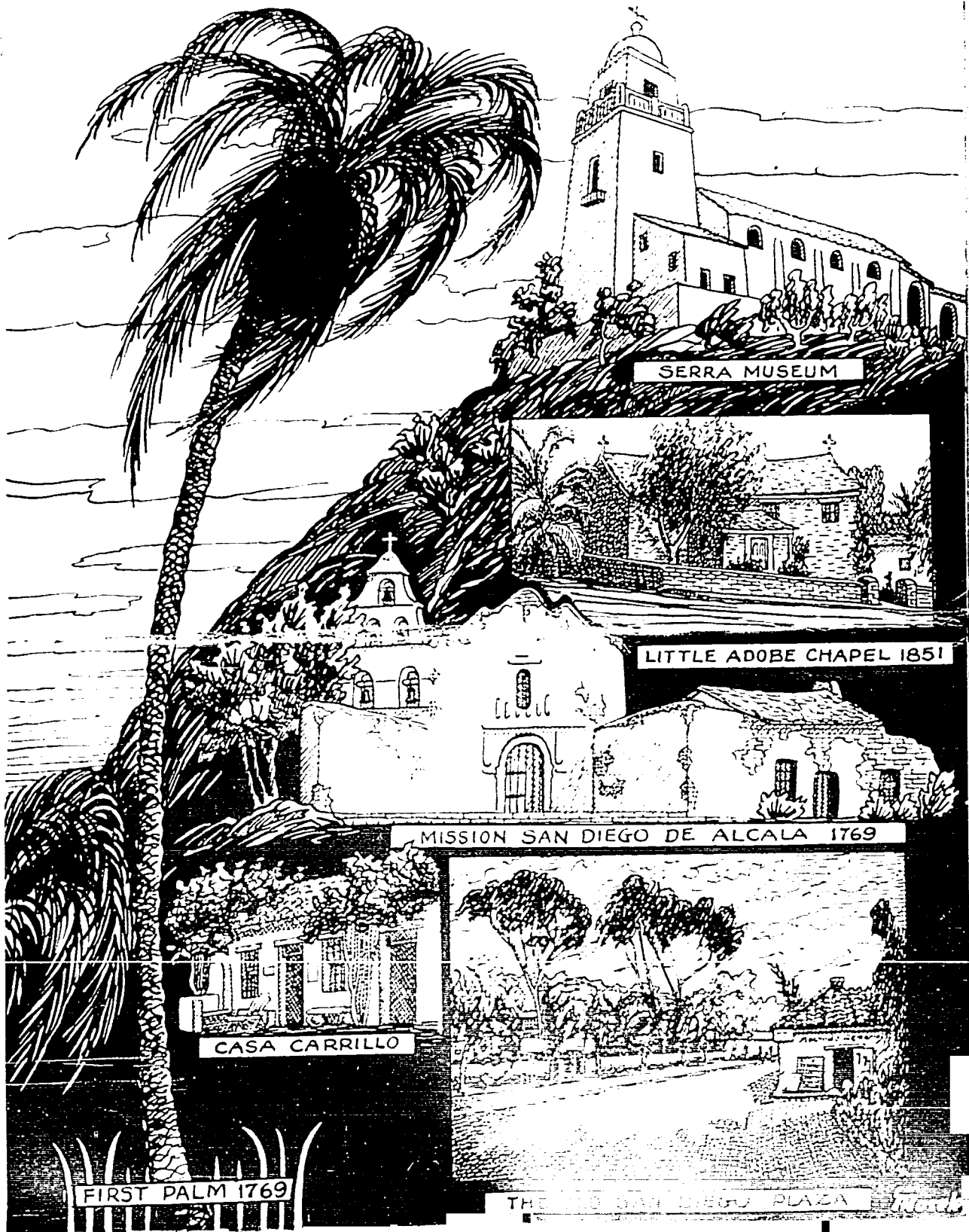

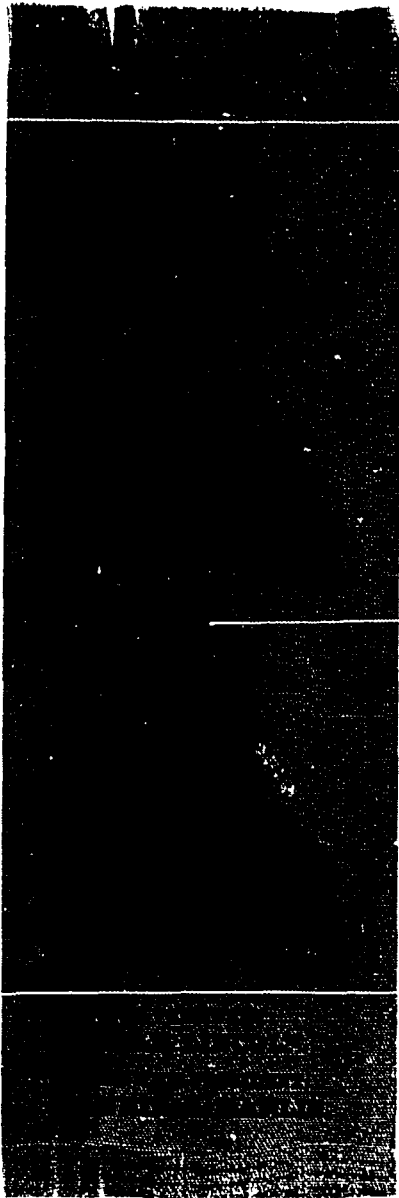

The particulars of your plans I neither know, or seek to know. You are vigilant and self-reliant; and, pleased with this, I wish not to obtrude any constraints or restraints upon you. While I am very anxious that any great disaster, or the capture of our men in great numbers, shall be avoided, I know these points are less likely to escape your attention than they would be mine - If there is anything wanting which is within my power to give, do not fail to let me know it.

And now with a brave Army, and a just cause, may God sustain you.

ARGUMENT.

The Gypsy Queen Handassah, reveals to him the fact that she has been betrayed by Sir Oliver Cross, and has followed him to seek reparation or, failing that, revenge. Turpin promises to aid her in righting the wrongs and to assist him in the work, summons to his aid, Dimber Damber and Jerry Jimp. On the arrival of the York mail coach, Turpin falls in love with Eleanor at first sight, and Eleanor who is accompanied by Barbara, a giddy old girl, who is her chaperone and companion is warned by Handassah of the danger in store for her. Dorothy, the pretty daughter of the Landlord of the Inn, is engaged to act as Eleanor's Maid. Meanwhile, Major Slasher has, by agreement with Sir Oliver Cross, been making ardent love to Mistress Barbara, and in the midst of the picturesque groupings and complications which arise at this point, the horn sounds the signal for departure, and the curtain falls on the starting of the coach on its way to York.

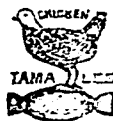

Major Slasher, assuming in the uncertain light, that Dick Turpin is really Sir Oliver Cross, betrays in his conversation his share of the plot, and Turpin taking advantage of this discovery reveals his identity to Slasher, and orders him placed in confinement by the Gypsies. He also summons Dimber Damber, and orders him to assume the uniform of Slasher, while Dorothy takes the dress of Barbara. The gypsies are then summoned and sufficient of Turpin's plans revealed to them to necessitate an immediate departure of most of the tribe for Rookwood Hall.

Act III, opens with a Night Scene in Rookwood Hall, where the retainers of Sir Oliver Cross, are awaiting the arrival of their master, who has ordered everything in preparation, even to the presence of the Parson, in anticipation of his successful abduction of Eleanor Mortimer. Dimber Damber and Dorothy (of course in the assumed characters of Major Slasher and Barbara) arrive and are received by the house-keeper with all honors due to the expected guests of Sir Oliver.
