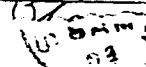

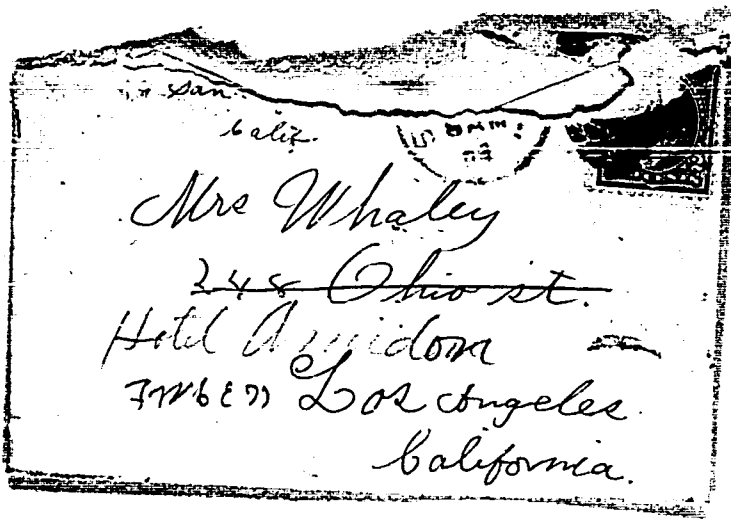

Dear Mrs. Whaley:

I have had a long talk with Mr. Hendrix and reported in part the substance to Lillie, and while she tells me to proceed to carry out the programme as lined out I do not feel to do so without your consent and approbation, hence this letter. Mr. Hendrix is determined to take steps looking to the Court setting his fee in the estate business, and says that he will apply for a fee of \$2500. While he is determined to strike for a pretty stiff fee, it does not carry the idea that he will exact the amount he applies for. After fully satisfying myself that he is determined to proceed as to the setting of his fee by the Court, it occurred to me to suggest that while he was making the application, why it would not be a good idea to also apply for the means of paying you your monthly allowance of \$100. per. month? He said this could be done, (and by the way, it would have to be done in such a quiet manner that Jenks would not get onto it) and in all probability the two respective amounts would swell the sum to that extent, that Jenks would have nothing left to wipe out his claim outside of his mortgage. Upon the Court allowing the amounts applied for, and an order for the sale of real estate to satisfy the same, Hendrix says we will be enabled to get the estate out of Court within the next ninety days. Now, a certain amount of confidence will have to be placed in Hendrix's living up to his promises to me, and while I have no fear of his doing otherwise than he may agree with me, yet I do not feel warranted in wholly assuming his doing so, hence want you to assume this yourself. It seems to me that the longer we let the settlement go on, the more liable are we to having Jenks come in and say we have not used due diligence in settling the estate, and as a result he will endeavor to have your monthly allowance from the start annulled, so I think we had better push matters as fast as we can looking to getting the whole thing out of Court, even though we do have to pay Hendrix a stiff fee. It does not matter what we may think or deem a fair compensation, he will no doubt get his allowance, as you know yourself, that Judges and Lawyers, are all off the same slice, and will both work together, and side in as well, whether it is right or wrong. So on the whole, I reiterate, I think it of great importance---with Jenks in the balance---to hurry this matter up as fast as possible, or we may have our monthly allowance cut off from the start. Hoping to hear from you soon, I am as ever

Dear Mrs. Whaley:

Your Postal telegram did not reach me till to-day, as I was at Tia Juana Hot Springs, and did not come up until to-day. I answered it, and had only deposited it in the office when I received a second from you. As I did not clearly understand the second, I wired you back that I would write. . . At the present writing I am all at seas as to divine what your aim is to convey the idea at this late day that you are inclined to break away from the arrangements I have already entered into. . . Your telegram of June 30th. was that your lowest price for the plant, was \$500, and told me to use my discretion. I understood by that that if I could not get any more by any possibility, to accept the \$500. and after using every effort to get a greater sum and in which I failed, I accepted the \$500. I remitted you the sum, less such charges as appeared in my statement accompanying, and in your acknowledgement you used language that fully approved of my course. After mailing mine of to-day I receive another telegram from you from which I am to understand that the \$500. deal is perfectly satisfactory, unless the plant goes to the MacCarthy's, in which case you demand \$600. The party who has dealt with me is a Mr. Bennett, who says his Company is an entire new one, and that the MacCarthy's have no interest whatever. Frank told me to-day that he had had a talk with the MacC's only a few moments before he saw me, and that they told him they were going to turn the plant over in six or eight days as they had a new plant on the way and which would have been here long before this if it had not been for the strike. Who are back of them I do not know, but it has been intimated to me that Llewelen and some others. Now in the first place, if I had not gone to the trouble to get an expert to thoroughly go over the plant to let me know just what it was worth I would have had nothing to do with selling it, as I would not think of trusting my judgement in a thing I knew nothing about, but after the party did go over it and told me if I could get any near \$500. dollars to take it, I acted upon his judgement and sold. I am perfectly satisfied that I got more than it was worth, and I am satisfied beyond a doubt that if the thing was held over till after the campaign, you could not get \$300 for it. You may have received several propositions about its purchase, but I will venture to say, that had you accepted any one of them you would not have got as much as you have. The offers they make all seem to be very nice, but were you to entertain any of them, you would find that there would be first one little thing that they could not fulfill and then another, and so it would go, until the campaign was over, then you could take your plant and whistle. Then there was another reason, I was desirous of disposing of it in a very quiet way, and that was, that I would be enabled to send you the money, and not run the risk of Mr. _____ getting his hands on it, which he surely would have done, and then you would have had a dandy time of getting much of it. As the matter now stands, the party paid me \$400 down, and while he thought at first it might be 30 or 60 days before he paid the balance, he came a few days after and said he would pay the balance as soon as I got the release from the mortgage. I can't see any

possible way out of delivering the plant, and if you refuse, he can not only get it by law, but in the event of a suit, you would place me in a very unenviable position. I have acted in good faith, and in doing so I believed most conscientiously that I was carrying out your best interests, and if it had not been that I was over anxious to put the money in yours rather than in others hands, and that I could most religiously confide in your screening me from any connection with the transaction, I certainly would have had nothing to do with it. I still believe you will screen me, and in order to do it, execute and mail the release without any further delay, and in future it matters not what comes up, always say that the negotiations were direct with you, and that I knew nothing about them. You will probably get a proposition from a Mr. Dryden, who is connected with M'Clain in his little sheet - "The Mail", but he is a man of no means I am informed, and it would be sheer nonsense to entertain any such, as Frank has put him up to write you. Rather than have you put me in a delicate position in this matter by attempting to back out and thus involve yourself in a lawsuit, I would rather agree to pay you the extra one hundred dollars, as soon as I could make it. I could not afford to have trouble arise with the party, as I gave him my word of honor that he should get the plant, otherwise he would not have paid me the \$400. as you know he would not have so done without some assurance that the trade would be closed as promised. I must confess that I am not only greatly surprised that you should have changed your attitude in the matter, but I cannot understand why in heavens name you are not anxious to get rid of the old thing which has always been a source of annoyance to you. All in Gods name these fellows are writing to you for and making propositions is that they may get the use of the plant for the present campaign, and there is not a particle doubt in my mind but they would do you up if you were to accede to them. I am doing every thing in my power to protect you but you seem inclined to act contrary to my advice and judgement which you have invited, and to say the least it makes me feel a little blue that such is an apparent fact. When we get this matter adjusted, I would rather discontinue further efforts in your behalf unless you place implicit confidence in me, as appreciation is worth more to me than anything else. Distrust, I cannot endure, and unless I can feel that I have ones undivided confidence, I would rather not do their business. I hope this will find you and Lillie both well, and trust I may hear from you with out delay.

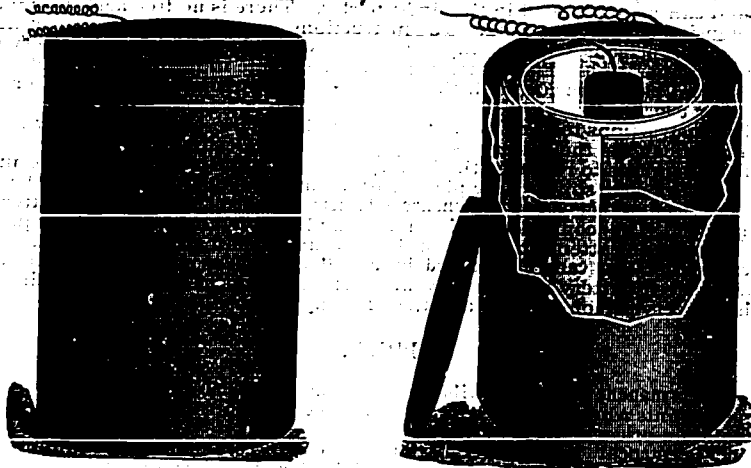

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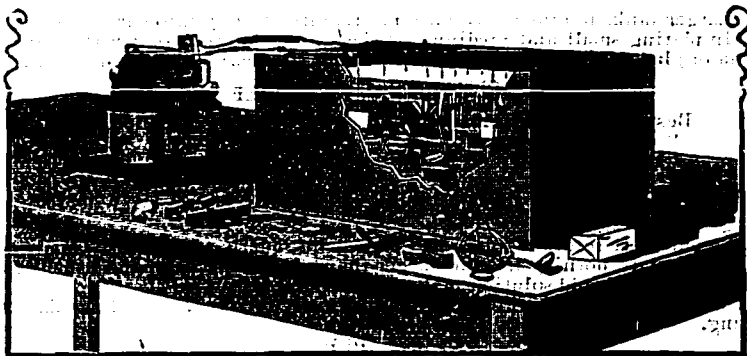

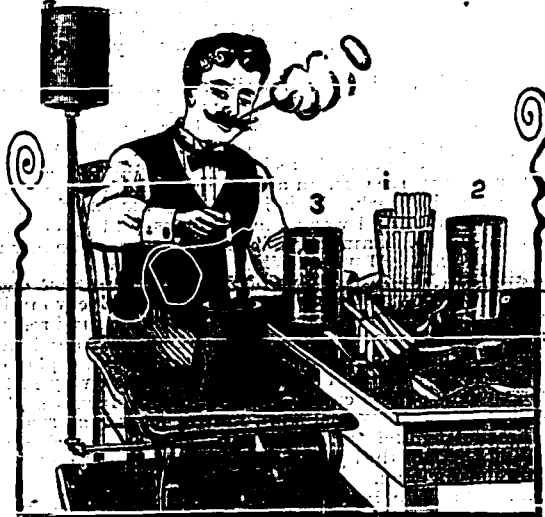

Our OLD RELIABLE is so constructed that the metal can be quickly melted on any ordinary cook stove, by burning either wood or coal, or on a gasoline burner or a common oil stove. 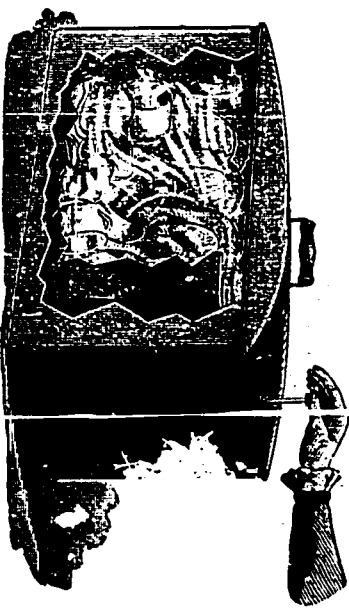
