Oct. 16. 1895.

Dear Mother: -

This has been a lovely day - cool yet sun-
shiny. Took a walk this
morning with Ozar and
stayed out till noon. I
hope this weather will
continue or get cooler -
which it will, I think.

I got my sewing out
- this afternoon - and made
my wrapper. Think I'll
stay until the snow
- comes then hire me home-
ward.

Never was in such
a dusty place before in
all my life. The whole

house has to be swept every morning. And never saw such a place for dining. Everyone seems to have a horse & buggy.

I returned Addie's call the other day. She has gone to Cerritos to work in a candy store. I don't think they are very sociable anyway. —

Mrs. Dalmarzo called yesterday. She is very nice — a sister of Mrs. Judge Locke and very much like her. Her little girl, Marian, is the nicest one that comes here to see Mabel.

I have sold one of the pups today. She gave a female to Mrs. Price some

time ago - 2 - with the understanding that they were not to sell any of her pups for less than \$5.00. They have been selling them for \$2.00 - and have a lot on hand now to dispose of. So much for doing people favors. -

I weighed myself last night - weigh 104 lbs - a gain of four lbs in three weeks. Pretty slow but I feel much better anyway. Am getting a big chest or one like I used to have. John says I am chicken breasted since wearing the brace. - Getting dark. More later. -

8.30. P.M. - Have been help-
ing Mabel with her sewing.
Am awfully rusty and
cobwebby but I had for-
gotten how to work out
some of the simplest exam-
ples.

We arrived safe and
sound at the Springs after a
most delightful trip & con-
dance with the night. We
took up our beds having
camped - had a good
food - the weather was
fine - we were camping very

good shade we had was in
cave's mouth before last. A
big red bull came bounding
up the canyon. The rattlesnakes
here are big, mostly mild.
They will not bite, however
in a wagon but they come
from all directions after anyone
on foot. His sovinn majesty
came toward our camp with
a stately, dignified measured
tread. Bay had fled to the
wagon when the animals
bellowing filled the canyon. I
I retained my umbrella and I

could stand it. Then I witted
and followed Bas. He passed
slowly along the path near
The camp looked over once
or twice, but made no motion
to come near us. He stayed
in the wagon for quite awhile.
He explored around the camp
next morning and found some
beautiful places along the creek
Cecilia, natural grotto full of
clear water about six feet deep
covered with overhanging branches
& a fallen tree trunk, it made
me think of that place spoke
of in The Golden of the Sea where
the devil fish held forth, and
the long north side the bay-
ing rocks we saw looked like
the identical fish itself.

I am sitting under a
ramada - a sort of bench
made of boughs. It is cool
and lovely here though the

quats are thick. I am most
agreeably disappointed in this
place. I think it is very
pretty. It is all under cul-
tivation and the tents and
trees and adobes and rocky
hills make a pretty picture.
Mrs. B. & I wandered up the
creek last eve and had a
drink of the hot water from
the bubbling spring. We took
our first bath last night
and sleep like tops after
it. I like it here and feel
better already. Don't know
how long they will stay.
The tent is pitched in a good
place on the rise and we are
going to have a ramada
built. Must have a cool
place to sit in - also a
place to hang the hammocks.
Have not seen many of the
Indians, but a little talk in
Spanish with some with

Alejandro. He is grey haired
now and has only seven-
teen children. - We have
everything for comfort. The
air seems to be full of sulphur.

How is your bed at home?
Have Mrs. Hall & Leonard gone
yet? I am very tired, I
could not have come with
us. I hope you are well.

Did you go to San Bernardino
for the Fourth? The American
Day was being here when
we arrived! He spent our
Fourth in camp and riding.

I hope you are well.
Don't think that you must
work too hard. Take it easy.
I wish you were here. It
is your name that is dis-
agreeable. I think the man is
going. Address Warner's Ranch,
Hot Springs. Don't forget the hotel
there. Don't forget the
-hills.

Stone wall, Cunningham's back
July 24, 1895.

Dear Mother:

Just at present I am seated
on the ground on a bed of dried
oak leaves, with my back against
some rocks. Bee is near me, stretched
full length, fast asleep. This is the
most beautiful place I have ever
seen or ever expect to see. The
hills are covered with grass, now
a little yellow in places. They
slope on all sides down to the
lake which is at present so low
in fact scarce raised by the wind.
It is the lower lake which
supplies the mill with flume
water. It is a large body of water
- about three miles long. It flows
in and out at the foot of the
mountains and just before
me lies an island - one hill
covered with grass, oak & pine.
The wind in the pine woods

like the ocean or the summit
of a train of cars. The oaks & pines
are all around us. This is the
most delightful place I have
visited. The mountains all around
are covered to the summits with
oaks & pines. The air is soft and
pure. We found a big pine tree
yesterday on the top of this
hill, the bark of which was
perforated with holes from top
to bottom by the woodpecker
and in each hole was an
acorn. Don't know how they ever
got them in unless they put them
in when they were small acorns,
because, try as we would, we
could not get them out. Mrs.
Searcy has promised to get
me a piece of the bark filled
with acorns to take home as a
souvenir. In fact, he would
not leave the place without
it. Mrs. Parley said this morning
that the acorns breed a worm

and it is for that that the wood-
peckers store them up. The whole
Pauly family is here.

There are several varieties
of fish in the lake. We had some
for dinner last eve - catfish.

Splendid fresh water fish.

The lake is lovely - only one or
two boats on it, though, so we
find it hard to have a boat, as
as they are always in demand.

We only arrived yesterday after
an awfully hard trip over a
rough, rocky road. Poor old Wiley
is all used up today - ditto
Kaiser. The two we picked up.
He is the laziest thing I ever knew.

The woodpeckers are
very pretty - black, with white spots
on their bodies & wings, and
~~all~~ of them have red heads.
The country around Julian is
very pretty - the town itself is
regular country. The rain rained
on us a little this side of Julian.
Thunder storm in the mountains.

We will be here about
four days longer. In the time
we will visit the mine and
the mill, go around to the
dam and drive up to the
cold spring on the big Cuza-
maca, from there to the top
of the mountain about two
miles. The view from the top
is magnificent, it is said. I
would not leave this locality
of all the places without
going first to the top of that
mountain. I wish you were
here. At 8 o'clock Mr. Gentry told
me about accommodations
at the hotel here. He said
the rates were 79¢ per night
per capita. Too steep, but it
would be good if we could
be here next two months
here in summer. It is now
warm in the middle of the
day but I can stand the warm

here better than at Aguacaliente.
It seemed to muddle me there -
- a regular hot box. Though the
springs did me good (and
no doubt in the world) that
the heat will also, but I'd
like to stay here for the next
three months and I think it
would do you a world of good
in break up the chain of dolor-
ous circumstances which has
woven itself too close about
you lately & always. I hope
you are feeling better after

of him last eve as I looked
out of the tent at the lake
in front of it. It was an
awful thing all through. I
wish I had stayed at home
since you did not go to San

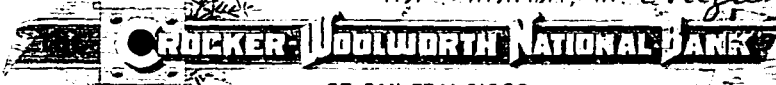

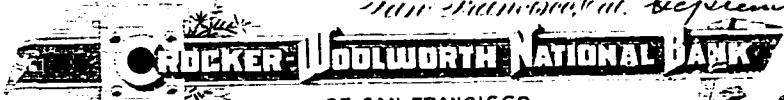

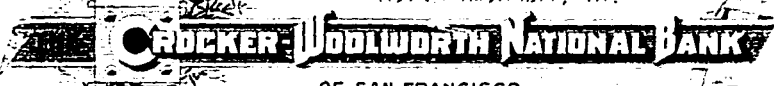
