
The opportunity presents itself of my sending a letter home, & I do so, with the object of venturing a little into the Month - I don't myself often let him to loof in what I say. I have been in this city since the 20th and now I am returning to the Coast this evening and tomorrow, for Queen Victoria and her royal spouse are now at the castle of Bright. The chief object in writing is to inform you that the long solicited wished for they had at last arrived. In a few hours I shall be returning from the ministerial dinner & shall be soon home. You will understand I will write upon reaching, and do not suppose you have anticipated me, & the Queen must have nothing to do but to send the letters which she intended upon returning. The name of the ship in which I am to sail is the ~~Wellesley~~ Captain Knight. He will be coming to see with considerable interest. I pray you not to be over anxious a very account. I shall write again when I do. The vessel is not large but a very good sailing ship, the captain who appears to be a pretty clever fellow, and that he has never been in a shipping time more than thirty days in any ~~restaurante~~. So you see there is great probability of my being with her on, or just before New Year's. How interesting it would be to know just the way, & place! I apprehend not the least danger in traversing the Ocean at this season of the year, or I would not undertake the voyage. I have few absent's in this time, and have passed many dangers. Truly, the wife protects us, and that I am returning to my friends, country and everything I hold dear, will put me in mind of this critical moment. But should anything happen to me, which I little apprehend, & dies of surprise or another, just to change suddenly my imminent death. Things are upon this truth, when we are in the beginning, in darkness for we see not the hand; Enclosedly when we meet with any affliction we must consider

I wish you could only see how Clark and some others speak now. Some were later
than at 27. He looks sombre, though I was much pleased with his speech at 27.
He speaks freely and could tell us many things of the Building & their intentions
and the progress of the work. He has a good deal to say about the
present condition of the country and the difficulties of the people. He
has promised to forward the manuscript to you and has said
he will do so as soon as he can get it ready. He has also
written to Mr. G. W. C. and Mr. J. C. and Mr. H. H. Williams
and will take of each a short account of his speech. He has given
you a copy of the speech of Mr. G. W. C. and will give you
one of his own. The book will be published in a few weeks.
I am sending the manuscript to you and will keep a copy
for myself. I hope you will like it.

Some French have just in the Easter week to day 23 - so I will go
home & wish to have a few days off from the work & family here to
see some in Paris & have a little time to go around & take up the old
habits again and all the good old times. The first few days will be passed at Chateauneuf
and then off to Paris for a few days to visit home and in order for me to be with the other
people in the Chateauneuf. It is difficult to get home without the loss of time. So I will probably
travel with it. I have invited a few visitors we find the distance is too great to go by
train & the cost of the car if you want to take time & money to drive so we will come down
to the Dr. Black church and you will be here to wash & get dressed so the people may see us
in our new dress. I wish I had more time but I have to get back to work on Monday
so I must go to Paris on Saturday morning & get back on Sunday night. I will send you
my address & telephone number & you may call me up or write to me at any time & I will be
glad to hear from you. I will take a few days each
weekend to go to Paris & see my friends. Please let me know when you will be home again.
