Remarkable Prayer of the Chaplain of the House of Representatives.

WASHINGTON, March 27.—The Chaplain's opening prayer in the House this morning was as follows:

"Give ear, O! God of Jacob, and awaken us to see the danger which threatens the civilized world of a revolution more tremendous than any of which history tells, in which the scenes of the reign of terror may be enacted in every capital of Europe and America. For long the few have mastered the many because they understood the open secret, 'tools to them that can use them;' but now the many have learned the secret of organization, drill and dynamite. Rouse the rich of this world to understand that the time has come for grinding, selfish monopoly to cease; that corporations may get souls in them, with justice, honor, conscience, and human kindness. Teach the rich men of this country that great fortunes are lent them by Thee for other purposes than to build and decorate palaces, to found private collections of art, to stock wine-cellers, to keep racing studs and yachts; and may they find better company than hostlers, grooms, jockeys, pool-sellers, and book makers. Teach them, O! God, that it is Thou who hast given them the power to get these fortunes; that it is to prove them to know what is in their hearts, whether they will keep Thy commandments or no; and that those commandments are: 'Thou shalt love the Lord, thy God, with all thy heart and thy neighbor as thyself;' that if the rich men of our land keep these commandments the poor will follow their example, and we, at least, will be saved from the days of tribulation that are fast coming on all the world. Help us, O! God, and save us."

Mr. Grosvenor of Ohio, asked unanimous consent that the prayer be printed in the Record.

Mr. James of New York, objected, remarking, sotto voce, to a gentleman who asked him to withdraw his objection, that it was because the prayer was an incendiary speech.

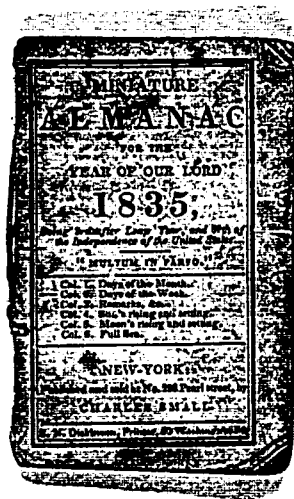

ECLIPSES IN 1858.

There will this year be eclipses of the Sun on the 5th May and 22nd Nov., a very small eclipse of the Moon on the 10th June, and a transit of Mercury on the 7th Nov. The solar eclipses on the 5th May will be visible in South America, and that of (28th Nov.) in Africa, and the south of Europe, and the lunar eclipse in Europe and Africa, has one part of value can be seen in New-England. The transit of Mercury, will, however, be partly visible, as follows, viz.

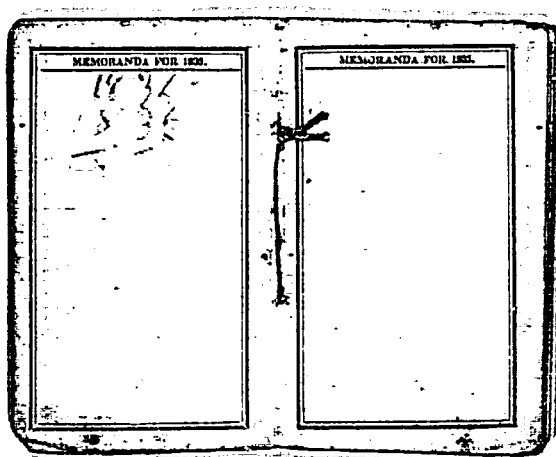

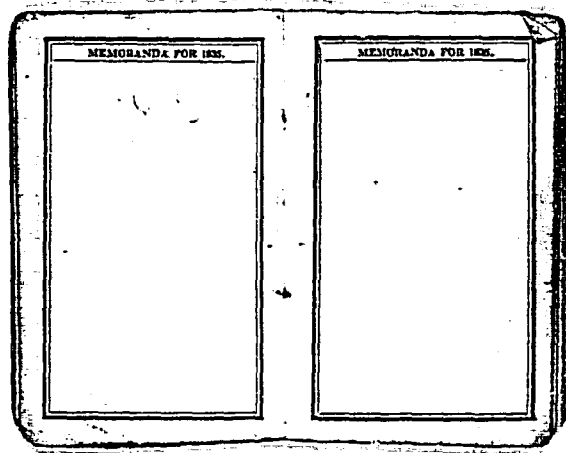

Time. There are some insects who live but a single day. In the morning they are born; at noon they are in full life; at evening they die. The life of man is similar to that of these insects. It is true, he lives for a number of years, but the period is so short, that every moment is of great value. Our existence may be compared to a journey; at every step of the traveller brings him nearer to the end of his journey, so every tick of the clock makes the limited number of moments allotted to us, still less.

Our life may be divided, like the day of the insect, into three parts; youth, or morning; man, or middle age, and evening or old age. In youth, we get our education, and lay up those stores of knowledge, which are to guide us in the journey before us. As this journey is of importance, we should be busy so the best that improves each abiding hour. I do not mean that we should never amuse ourselves; on the contrary, amusement is absolutely necessary to all, and particularly to the young. But what I mean is, that none of the time allotted to study, or business, or duty, should be allowed to pass in idleness. Every moment should be improved for we have a journey before us, and if we lagge by the way, the time in which it is to be performed, will pass, and while we are yet unhoused or unharnessed in the wilderness, the sun will set, and the shadows of night fall upon us. Middle age is a time of action, and it is important to lay up knowledge and wisdom in youth, that we may act well and wisely in these after days. Old age is the evening or winter of life. It

is shrouded with the shadows of coming night, or chilled by the frost of coming death. Yet it is not a trial from which we should shrink, unless, indeed, we have wasted our time, and made no preparation against the issue that is to follow.

Making Resolutions. Resolve to perform your duty; perform without fail, what you resolve. If you form a resolution, and then break it, you set yourself a bad example, and you are likely to follow it. A promise may get the habit of breaking his resolutions; this is no fault to the character and mind so an incurable disease to the soul. No promise can become great, but by keeping his resolutions; no promise ever respected except, who could not keep them.

Happiness. Virtue, integrity, and constancy are the effects of men to procure that happiness, which the nature of the mind requires; but most seem to be ignorant both of the source and means of genuine blessedness. Religion alone can afford true joy and permanent peace. It is this that inspires fidelity, supports patience, and by its prospects and promises throws a cheering ray into the darkest shade of human life.

Honesty. To be practical in our engagements, and just in our dealings though it may sometimes seem to be contrary to our present advantage, it always seems in the end to promote our true interests. A bad and honest course of conduct will always be rewarded by the approbation of our fellow

creatures; and this approbation will naturally be followed by good repute and grateful returns, which will certainly tend to promote, and give success to all our undertakings. It is a maxim worthy of being written in letters of gold that there is no method so certain of obtaining the plots of wicked men against us as by acting uprightly.

There is England. The existing system in England, it has been said, lays - Taxes upon every article which comes into the country, or enters the land, or is placed under foot; taxes upon every thing that is pleasant to see, hear, feel, smell, and taste; taxes upon warmth, light, and locomotion; taxes on every thing on earth and the waters under the earth; on every thing that comes from abroad, or is grown at home; taxes on the raw material; taxes on every value that is added to it by the industry of man; taxes on the waste which pumps man's appetite, and the drink that restores him to health; on the crime which decorates the judge and the rope which hangs the criminal; on the frame walls of the coffin, and the shroud of the corpse; at last, at last, consumed or spent, we must pay. The secondary whips the tassel top; the lawless youth manages his tassel horse with a tassel bridle and a tassel road; and the dying Englishman, snuffing his snuffbox which has paid 7 per cent, into a spoon which has paid 15 per cent, throws himself back upon his chair, but which has paid 22 per cent, makes his will on an ES stamp and expires in the arms of an apothecary who has paid £100 for the

privilege of passing him to death, and his
 whole property is there taxed from 2 to 10
 per cent. Besides the private, large fees are
 demanded for carrying him to the church;
