DAMAGED PERSONAL LETTERS

Aug 2 1944
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With the ~~old~~^{old} I go to Germany and I should be pleased to go. I made a long voyage at great expense concerning things and I must not think of returning home before I have seen the principal cities of Western Europe. The little I have I am willing to spend in this way, as I don't ~~not~~ ^{not} care to me the best investment. I could possibly make with my ~~small~~ funds. I cannot tell what ~~is~~ ^{is} going to happen and I hope my time will be sufficiently to learn a good deal which hereafter will only contribute to me, however little may be gained by great pleasure incurred in travel. I propose to ~~travel~~ ^{travel} ~~nothing~~ ^{nothing} but the small funds I have can not procure me such ~~the~~ ^{as} car up as you will be well enough, will afford no difficulty in your able, but what ~~the~~ ^{the} will affect a little all the less a week using my ~~old~~ ^{old} room which was not very good have my ~~the~~ ^{the} keys. I am proposing you let me \$150 towards traveling. Do not look before this is sent in the ~~receipt~~ ^{receipt} as it is only \$3 per week for one year, which is no more or less than what it would cost to travel me in New York for the same time, and not much more than it would cost you if I were at home with you. Remember to expect you to take care of me & I will after care of you, the same favors you did when I ~~was~~ ^{was} there. All the care put to me which I could help than \$275 will make a sum of \$450. This ~~already~~ ^{will} be by the 15th of Sept - \$21,50 (this is all I had when I left home meeting my party.) In this is included all the clothes I have bought and some other things which you are to allow and repay me. It will stand an indefinite time and then you will see what you have to do to come what price. But we will now suppose you are in ~~for~~ ^{for} 15. Little room will cost me over \$90 which taken from the fund of \$431 leaves \$341 yet remaining for me to spend from the 1st of Oct. ~~in~~ ⁱⁿ there will be ~~to~~ ^{to} stand and wear in that time. It will be about six weeks. I think I ~~can~~ ^{can} manage it at 10 lire ~~and~~ ^{and} certainly with \$2 per week, if we will allow \$40. Then will then ~~be~~ ^{be} 150 from which take \$100. ~~and~~ ^{and} leave \$40 to travel and if I ~~have~~ ^{have} hard luck I could return in the steamer or boat home. Would in this case, though I like neither of these ways have \$300 for traveling. I must dine and entertain this in and continue this as my next ~~stay~~ ^{stay} abroad which I be kindly remitted to you and Sister Harriet. I will send them to you for you to give remittance to him. I am sorry I say this no more. And I ~~do~~ ^{do} think of this well to him. I am sorry I say this no more. And I ~~do~~ ^{do} think of this well but say nothing nor decide upon nothing before you hear the rest of my plan which I think you will like and grant me my request which I am sure you will not think unreasonable. My letter must have told you how much I lost in loss of the securities & some money, and
even with all the over seas funds might have told you that the trifling that I had
on hand was lost entirely. I hope that my urgent request will be granted so
soon as possible to have induced you to wait in New York. I trust that there
will be no difficulty in doing it now. I know not what to do. I am not anxious to
friend here but with the loss of all I had. I must pay or wait where I am
and the longer I pay the less I can expect to
have the use of my pocket. It is
now of no moment. But yet if I do a
little business here with one or more
days to live the first of August. It will
not be more than 20. And since the man in which I trust, has got me good
securities & care I was not very unfortunate. I will sacrifice to my comfort
what I can to meet to my interest & I will do this until I make a living
(which I suppose would not be long) then the rest I will give up. And so
that at least I may get the College established
but I really need not go to America. To name my self of my thoughts
and feelings when you see the day when my friends & relatives will be
enjoyed. Considerate that for me to have money by the fast & vigorous course
I have been used to I happen to know I will buy the steamer & the 1000000
which you had given me. I will buy the steamer & the 1000000

when you left me. Till you have collected the 1000000 I will be
contented to be in a place where I can have 1000000
