DRIVING OUT FOREIGN INSURANCE COMPANIES.

We feel like coming to the defense of the late Legislature of this State in their action adverse to the great foreign insurance companies of the East which have been doing the bulk of the insurance business in this State. It required them to confine their defense of suits against them to the State Courts; to appoint a general local manager, for all of whose acts the company should be in the fullest degree responsible; to return seventy-five percent in cash of present values on surrendered policies, and imposed severe, and, indeed, excessive fines for non-compliance with these provisions, or even for delay in submitting to their requirements. The San Francisco Chronicle, whose columns for the last year show a great deal of advertising from these great companies, in a late article on this subject, bitterly bewails this adverse legislation and pitches into the Legislature after this fashion:

"There was a great deal of bad tinkering done upon the laws by our last California Legislature, but in nothing was there more culpable stupidity—to suggest no worse motive—than in the actions respecting insurance matters which were added to the Code.

Now, we fall to see the "double stupidity" on the part of the Legislature above referred to, and for the following reasons: It cannot be denied that our domestic life insurance companies are conducted on as stable a basis as any of their older and magnificent rivals of the East. The truth is, the whole business of life insurance is to a certain degree a fraud upon the public, and any restrictions however stringent which may tend to curtail the business and keep it within the immediate view of the local public and in the hands of men whose record and business habits are perfectly understood, are a blessing to the community at large. The idea of the late Legislature undoubtedly was something of this kind, and also to keep at home the enormous amount of money annually taken out of circulation for premiums to the foreign companies. The Chronicle says: "Should the result of the application of this obnoxious law be the withdrawal of all the foreign companies, our citizens will be deprived of the advantage of life insurance in some of the most stable companies in the land." This would, in the general light in which the life insurance business is now regarded, be indeed a terrible affliction. We venture the assertion that outside of San Francisco and the ranks of the gamblers of California street, whose fortunes are liable to be scattered to the winds by a single unfortunate turn, there is not a business man in the State of California who so

From Washington.

The public debt statement shows as follows: Total debt statement \$2,201,091,037; total interest, \$33,264,093; Cash in Treasury, \$5,193,897; coin; \$11,177,703 currency, special deposits, \$50,050,000. Total, \$149,189,033. Debt, less cash in Treasury, \$2,145,208,438; decrease the month, \$4,450,838.

Railroad Troubles.

Chicago dispatches of the first instant say that the allies of the Northwestern Railroad are about commencing suit in Chancery, in one of the Wisconsin Districts, probably in the United States Circuit Court before Judge Drummond, to enjoin and prevent all further proceedings against their railroad or any of its agents under the so-called Potter Railroad Act of the last Wisconsin Legislature. Suit is brought by the Northwestern Company because they are an alien company and can sue in the United States Court, while the St. Paul company, being a State company, cannot do. The injunction asked for will be for the purpose of restraining and prohibiting a great deal of litigation and other alleged oppressive proceedings which are being inaugurated against the company.

The public have been systematically blighted by these mammoth foreign companies. Two-thirds of the premiums are squandered for the payment of officers, massive buildings, furniture and gratuities to runners, and yet they talk about low rates. For gamblers, brokers and wild cat speculators, life insurance will do but for the great mass of the people, with good business habits, we recommend an investment of the money that would otherwise go for premiums, in desirable real estate, as far more certain of a remunerative return. With these views, and as a means of encouragement of domestic institutions for keeping our money at home, and as discouraging the business of life insurance generally, and thereby making men more careful, we commend the action of the late Legislature as statesmanlike in this behalf.

THE ASIATIC-AMERICAN CABLE.

There seems to be no doubt now that San Diego has been centered upon as the landing place for the great Asiatic Cable, the laying of which will commence at an early date. In addition to the *Chronicle's* interview with Cyrus W. Field, published in yesterday's *World*, in which that great cable projector expressed himself decidedly favorable to the southern line, the following from the *Alta's* Yokohama correspondent, under date of April 25th, will be found interesting:

A PACIFIC CABLE TO AMERICA.

The United States steamer "Tuscarora," Commander Holknap, arrived here April 23d, in thirty-four days from Honolulu. She is engaged in the special scientific service of examining the bottom of the Pacific along the proposed bed for a cable from San Diego, California, to the Hawaiian Islands; thence via Brooks' Midway Island to this port. She made seventy-two successful deep sonar casts of her sounding apparatus between Honolulu and Yokohama, in none of which was the bottom at a greater depth than 3,297 fathoms, or about one mile and four fms.

After to fitting she will examine the southeastern coast of the Japanese Group, and thence run a line of soundings to Tanaga, one of the Aloutian Islands, whence she will follow the arc of a great circle to the point reached during her cruise last Autumn from
