Throughout the State, and especially in the southern half of it, public sentiment is very strongly aroused in favor of aid to the Texas Pacific Railroad. The following remarks, from the *San Mateo County Times*, fairly express the feeling which is at this time uppermost among the people of Southern California: "The Central Pacific Railroad has taken alarm and is much excited about the progress made by Tom Scott in his Texas Pacific scheme. Competition is the life of trade, as monomopoly is a relic of barbarism. Sixties Mississippi, some centuries ago, made a fortune out of a monopoly on gold and silver trade. The Central Pacific Railroad in our own day sees the way of making a fortune if it is suffered to continue its monopoly of overland travel to California. As a matter of fact there is abundant room for another railroad such as is proposed, and not only room but a positive necessity for it. The single artery of overland communication which is open between California and the East is even now barely sufficient for the vastly increased and rapidly growing commerce of this coast. It is also inconveniently situated for a large portion of the residents of the State, and worst of all it is without a competitor, and possesses all the fatal facilities for extortion which are entailed to a monopoly. It is difficult to see on what grounds opposition can be offered to the Texas Pacific. The new road needs no subsidy—asks none. It merely asks Government to endorse its bonds, for which it has ample security. In a vast continent like America, with immense wealth as yet undeveloped and regions whose resources have scarcely been explored, railroads are a positive necessity, and we can scarcely have too many of them. Each new road as it is opened adds infinitely more than its own value to the taxable property of the country it traverses. It increases the value of adjacent land, it makes the products of every section it traverses accessible to the great Eastern markets, and adds, as no other agency can add, to the solid prosperity of the entire country. In the line proposed by the Texas Pacific are districts which require as much as any others in the country, the humanizing and developing influences of a railroad, and the easy communication it furnishes with the outer world. The selfish interests of the monopolists of the Central Pacific should not be allowed for an instant to weigh against the solid advantages offered by its rival, and the indications are that this is the case. The new project would with one stroke double the population of the State, and would be popular pro-

The Secretary of the Treasury has transmitted to the House a statement of the amounts paid since 1860 to land grant railroads for the transportation of Government troops and supplies. The aggregate of the payments is \$259,393 04. A portion of the payments were made by disbursing officers of the Quartermaster General's Department, and a portion were made by Treasury settlements. The question which will arise on this statement, under the law, is as to the liability of the bonds to refund this whole amount of nearly \$1,000,000. It is probable that all these bonds are bound by an agreement to transport, free of charge, Government troops and supplies.

NOMINATION DAY.

To-day is nomination day throughout the Province, except in the constituencies of Gaspé and Chicoutimi, for which, owing to their remoteness, the nominations are fixed later on. By law the nominations must have been made between noon and one o'clock at the chief office of each constituency, the Returning Officer immediately declaring the election completed where only one candidate is nominated, and fixing this day week for the polling in the case of two or more. It will thus be seen that, in the actual struggle, the day is to some extent an interesting and momentous one, fixing as it undoubtedly does the political color for the next five years of a goodly number of constituencies through elections by acclamation both on the Government and the Opposition sides and explicitly defining in the others the several candidatures upon which the contest will be fought out at the polls on Friday next.

THE CENTRE DIVISION.

Mr. Peasey's address to the electors of the Centre, which the reader will find in our advertising columns, is a document not only remarkable for its manly and outspoken frankness, but for the admirable and timely spirit of conciliation and good will, which it breathes in the interests of the Province and of all classes, creeds and origins of its population. Unlike the so-called independent candidate for Quebec West, Mr. Peasey takes the people of the Centre unreservedly into his confidence and explicitly tells them what are his principles and his intentions in presenting himself in the independent ticket. There is, in fact, no possibility for misconception left as to his attitude, present or future. He publicly avows himself to be a moderate Liberal, but a Liberal independent of all parties, who is only desirous of entering the political arena at the urgent request of the best men on both sides to promote the substantial good of his native city and to quench that spiteful spirit of party which has resulted in such serious consequences for the whole Province and which many of our most prominent and patriotic politicians have been anxious

heartily rally to his cause; and, all considered, the appearance of things is such as to satisfy even the most skeptical that his victory on the 2nd December is not only secure, but that it will be crushing in its effect as an expression of popular opinion for the candidate of the people's choice. On the other hand, Mr. Murphy's aristocratic friends are finding that it is not all such plain sailing with them as they imagined at the outset, and their candidate must by this time have a pretty good notion of the value of their pompous professions to do as they pleased with an independent division like Quebec West. Mr. Murphy's friends may be capital hands at manipulating deals or coals or cod fish, but when it comes to manipulating the will, the opinions and the votes of free men, they get altogether beyond their depth. They can concoct nicely laid schemes for the purpose, no doubt, in their cosy offices in Peter street, but when it comes to put them into practice, they usually find that they "gang all a-glee." And in this instance they are going and going to go that way with a vengeance, if we are not very much mistaken. And what else is to be expected from a cause supported by men, who have so little sympathy with the masses composing the division that they would hardly vote at the same poll house in an election contest with a working man or a poor man, if they could help it, for fear his taunt might come between the wind and their dignity? It is time the bone and sinew of our population got to properly understand these worthies, whose object at all times is simply to make dupes and tools of them for their own selfish aggrandizement. They should be sharply taught for good and all that they are not the ruling class or interest in Quebec West, and we have every confidence that, with continued unanimity and perseverance in hard work on the part of Mr. Carbray's friends to still further increase his majority, the lesson they will receive on the 2nd December will be a valuable and a suggestive one for their future guidance. A long pull, a strong pull and a pull altogether will do the business effectually and we sincerely trust, with the Chairman of the mass meeting at the Champlain Market Hall, that no stone will be left unturned by the friends of the good cause for the purpose.

THE CONTEST IN MEGANTIC.

Mr. Irvine has been pleased to characterize as vexatious the opposition to his election by acclamation for Megantic, but he knew better than to complete the Parliamentary phrase and add that it is also frivolous. In fact, no man knows better that he has long alienated from himself the feeling of respect and confidence with which he was once viewed by the more solid element of the constituency and that the estrangement

At all events, it will give him business enough of his own to mind without interfering with that of other constituencies and especially with those into which this city is divided, where he has been giving himself such an infinity of trouble to create division.

SPEEDY JUSTICE.

Our American despatches yesterday contained a very suggestive item in the announcement from Jersey City that the convicted directors of the defunct Mechanic and Laborers' Savings' Bank have been refused a new trial, but that, the accused being prominent citizens, the prospect of their being sent to State Prison has created a sensation. We trust for the credit of American justice that the social position of these rascals will not be allowed to interfere with their consign punishment. It has too long been reproached upon the American system that the rich man could defy the law, and with a few honorable exceptions it is scarcely necessary to say that this reproach has been fully merited. If all public robbers in high position like these bank directors and cashiers were mercilessly treated like the poor man when he commits himself—perhaps, to obtain bread for his starving children, or as the scoundrels who ruined the City of Glasgow bank were some time ago in Scotland, we would doubtless put an end effectually to these huge and destructive financial frauds, which are wrecking the happiness of so many poor families in the United States and elsewhere.

DATE OF LORD LORNE'S RETURN.

A cable despatch announces that the Governor General, accompanied by the Princess Louise, will sail from Liverpool by the steamship the 12th of January, and arrive at Halifax on or about the 20th of that month. This will allow His Excellency an interval of rest before the meeting of Parliament, which will be convened early in February.

SPECIAL CABLE REPORTS.

BERLIN, November 24.—The Land Commissioners have issued a notice calling attention to the powers they possess to hear applications from laborers seeking to compel the farmers to provide better dwellings.

It is stated former named Sullivan, returning from his recent tour, was fatally beaten and his corpse concealed. Five arrests were made.

LONDON, Nov. 24.—Earl Cowper, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, at Belfast last night, said the more he saw of the country the more he was convinced that dissatisfaction had always existed, though sometimes in a dumb and sullen state, and under the surface. It was their duty at the present moment to reduce it again to a dumb and sullen state, and then do as much as possible in one generation to remove the dissatisfaction and, if possible, the prejudices of the Irish people.

The Times, commenting on Earl Cowper's speech, says: "It is far more likely that the measures of coercion will have to be made more stringent than suspended, even the temporary suspension

His conduct in the unfortunate Baron Grant affair also militates against any hope of success he might have entertained. Mr. Murphy belongs to the old school of politicians who thought and acted as if the people were made expressly to vote them into high offices, while they on their part turned up their noses in semi-aristocratic fashion, and went on their way with undignified contempt for the people. Mr. Carby, on the other hand, is of the young school; he is of those who think honesty should reign in high as well as in low places, and that an aristocracy in Canada is an anachronism. Besides being a cleverer man than Mr. Murphy, he is more consistent and he has a reputation for integrity and probity which a good many Parliamentary candidates might envy."

PARIS, November 25.—A book has been published entitled "Real mission of kings, by one of them." The King of Bavaria is credited with its authorship. The book is very severe on Bismarck. It denounces the war of 1870 as immoral and impious and describes Bismarck as incurably inimical to kings and people.

ROBBED AND MURDERED.

OSFORD, N.C., Nov. 25.—Thomas Lynch, merchant, was robbed and murdered on the highway on Tuesday night. Two negroes were arrested on suspicion and will probably be lynched.

FAILURE.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25.—The apparent assets of Baum & Co., failed liquor dealers, whose liabilities amount to \$50,000, are only \$5,000. The firm are severely criticized for refusing to produce their books.

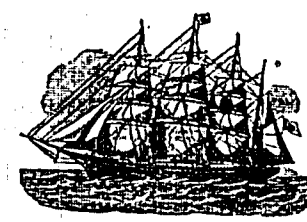
