CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIAL NEWS.

Published January 20, 1875.

Throughout the State, and especially in the southern half of it, public sentiment is very strongly aroused in favor of aid to the Texas Pacific Railroad. The following remarks, from the *Sun Mateo County Times*, fairly express the feeling which is at this time uppermost among the people of Southern California: "The Central Pacific Railroad has taken alarm and is much exercised about the progress made by Tom Scott in his Texas Pacific scheme. Compulsion is the life of trade, no monopoly is a relic of barbarism. Sir Giles Mompesson, some centuries ago, made a fortune out of a monopoly on gold and silver thread. The Central Pacific Railroad in our own day sees the way of making a fortune if it is suffered to continue its monopoly of overland travel to California. As a matter of fact there is abundant room for another railroad such as is proposed, and not only room but a positive necessity for it. The single artery of overland communication which is open between California and the East is even now barely sufficient for the vastly increased and rapidly growing commerce of this coast. It is also inconveniently situated for a large portion of the residents of the State, and worst of all it is without a competitor, and possesses all the fatal facilities for a monopoly. It is difficult to see on what grounds opposition can be offered to the Texas Pacific. The new road needs no subsidy—asks none. It merely asks Government to indorse its bonds, for which it has ample security. In a vast continent like America, with immense wealth as yet undeveloped and regions whose resources have scarcely been explored, railroads are a positive necessity, and we can scarcely have too many of them. Each new road as it is opened adds infinitely more than its own value to the taxable property of the country it traverses. It increases the value of adjacent land, it makes the products of every section it traverses accessible to the great Eastern markets, and adds, as no other agency can add, to the solid prosperity of the entire country. In the line proposed by the Texas Pacific are districts which require as much as any others in the country, the humanizing and developing influences of a railroad, and the easy communication it furnishes with the outer world. The selfish interests of the monopolists of the Central Pacific should not be allowed for an instant to weigh against the solid advantages offered by its rival, and the indications are that this is the way in which the new trans-continental project would with one or two soundly made popular pro-

ed for an idea. To w. also sold at the solid advantages offered by its rival, and the indications are that this is the view taken by both Houses. It has been abundantly shown that this new transcontinental project would with proper safeguards provide popular protection against monopoly in overseas travel and transportation."

The Pittsburg Commercial, in an able article, entitled "A Remedy for Business Prostration," brings forward unanswerable arguments in favor of aiding the completion of the Texas Pacific road. The Commercial says: "The money to build the Texas Pacific Railroad can be had at once if the Government indorses the interest on its bonds. It is ready in Europe and it is lying idle in our own financial centers. All that is wanted to bring it forth and put it in circulation, is confidence, and this a Government indorsement will create. There is no risk in this, because the Government is amply secured, and will save more each year by having the road completed than the amount it guarantees, and the beneficial effect of its consummation on the business of our people, as well as on that of the entire South and Southwest, would be as immediate as it would unquestionably be important."

The Washington Chronicle of the 16th says: "The contest between the Southern Pacific and the Texas Pacific is waged prominently about the Capitol, each committee that can claim the principle at issue as an adjunct of its duties being the recipient of advice and explanation. Mr. Cotton and Engineer Gray, of the first named line, transferred the scene of operation yesterday to the House Public Lands Committee. They desire Congress to allow the company they represent to construct a branch line down the valley to the east of the present location in California, where the Territory is more thickly settled, and also to continue on east from the Colorado river until a junction is formed with the Texas Pacific. The land grant, of course, is to continue the same as that allowed them by existing law for the road already authorized and partly constructed. The committee took no action."

The Secretary of the Treasury has transmitted to the House a statement of the amounts paid since 1860 to land grant railroads for the transportation of Government troops and supplies. The aggregate of the payments is \$259,300. A portion of the payments were made by disbursing officers of the Quartermaster General's Department, and a portion were made by Treasury settlements. The question which will arise on this statement, under the law, is as to the liability of the roads to refund this whole amount of nearly \$1,000,000. It is claimed that all these roads are bound by an agreement to transport, free of charge, Government troops and supplies.

"'Tis an ill bird that fouls its own nest," says the proverb; and that saying has a local application.

On the Marshall grade, twenty-four miles northeast of San Diego, over ten inches of rain fell during the last storm.

Mr. Henry Hemmell, the conchologist, returned to San Diego on the last steamer. He is warmly greeted by his numerous friends.

Brother Muna, of Los Angeles, is in the city, and will dedicate the new Catholic Church on Sunday next, and also confirm the children that may be presented.

The heavy loads of back mail received yesterday and the day before, are clearing up arrears, and our people now hope for the blessing of regular mails for the remainder of the season.

The total rainfall in the Cajon Valley during the late storm was five inches. There is a government standard rain gauge out there now, and the rainfall is regularly observed and recorded.

We had a day of sunshine yesterday, and a cool northwest wind prevailed in the evening, but the clouds in the eastern sky after twilight lead us to doubt if the weather is yet quite settled.

We learn that there will not be so much corn raised in San Luis Rey Valley this year, owing to the low price and the extra labor required to

T. W. PARK says with reference to freighting ores from Panama: Through contracts can be made for ore from Los Angeles to Liverpool at the rate of £4 10 per ton of 2,240 pounds, and if large quantities came forward the rate would be made £4. The Surprise Valley mines could furnish 300 tons a day at a fortnight's notice, and the district 1,000 tons, but this cannot be done while the ore has to be hauled from the interior to the seaport. A railroad, broad gauge, from Truxton or Shoo Fly to the mouth of Surprise Cañon can be built and equipped for \$2,000,000, and this ore traffic, with the accompanying merchandise and passenger business, would make it the best paying road in the United States.

A narrow three foot gauge, could be constructed for about \$1,000,000. There are other mines of immense value in the lower part of the State, the ore of which can never be worked on the spot for the want of wood and water, and which must be dormant until there is railroad communication with the ocean. Speaking of landing the ore twice at Panama, through the distance which ships have to lie from the railroad wharf, he says the incon- venience is not so great as is supposed, and that the total expense is less than the \$2,000,000 it would take to build a wharf to the anchorage. In regard to the cost of sending these ores by steam and rail to England instead of by the cape and sailing vessels, he says the saving of insurance, with the interest on high grade ore, compensate for the difference in freight. These ores, when rich in copper, will continue to be sent to Swansea, as the copper, which would otherwise be lost, pays the cost of freight and reduction.

CONGRESSMAN HOUGHTON stands like a rock on the side of the people. He is proving by his manly, straightfor- ward course that there was something more than words in his declarations on the railroad question when he was a candidate before the people. Houghton believes in railroads, and he holds that competition is demanded for the develop- ment of the country and the prosper- ity of its citizens. On that platform he was elected, and upon it he would be re-elected, term after term, as long as he would consent to run.

Dr. BRENNAN's first lecture at Hor- ton's Hall last evening brought out a full house. The subject was "The Throne of the Mind," and the lecture was a very interesting one. Dr. Brennan certainly possesses the gift of holding the attention of an audience. His lectures are infinitely superior, both in matter and manner, to those of Prof. Fowler on the same subject. The subject for this evening is "The Path of Life," or, "How to live, and what to live for."

NOMINATION DAY.

To-day is nomination day throughout the Province, except in the constituencies of Gaspé and Chicoutimi, for which, owing to their remoteness, the nominations are fixed later on. By law the nominations must have been made between noon and one o'clock at the chief offices of each constituency, the Returning Officer immediately declaring the election completed where only one candidate is nominated, and fixing this day week for the polling in the case of two or more. It will thus be seen that, in the actual struggle, the day is to some extent an interesting and momentous one, fixing as it undoubtedly does the political color for the next five years of a goodly number of constituencies through elections by acclamation both on the Government and the Opposition sides and explicitly defining in the obvious the several candidatures upon which the contest will be fought out at the polls on Friday next.

"BROKER ENO'S" SUSPENDED.—The Montreal Star says:—"The institution at No. 59 St. Francois Xavier street, established by one Lumpkin and others, of Boston, and which was styled "the Public Stock Exchange," has been closed up after an existence of a few months. The after of the "Exchange" were handed in to Mr. Robert Kane the representative of the heirs Queneau property, and all claims appear to have been paid. The "Exchange" at one time appeared to be doing a rushing business with margin speculators in American produce and stocks, but latterly its originators are thought to have lost money.

TWO CHILDREN STRAY AWAY FROM HOME.—As Mr. O'Flaherty and another gentleman were walking on St. Louis street yesterday afternoon, they met two little girls, each about five years of age, apparently bewildered and not knowing whither to wend their way. They made enquiries of them and found that they had strayed away from home. The little things could not, however, say where they lived. They were brought to the Central Police Station, and there the sergeant on guard recognized them as children of Messrs. McHenry and O'Dowd, of Little Champlain street. Their friends were communicated with and quickly sent to bring them home.

THE SACRIFICIAL CABLE.—An Ottawa despatch says:—"The Cable which has just been laid across the mouth of the Saguenay River under the superintendence of Mr. Gibson is an experiment, being armored with phosphor bronze wire, and is the first cable of the kind ever laid. The phosphor bronze wire is supposed to be imperishable, being copper wire treated with phosphorus and is a reproduction of the bronze of the ancients. The advantages of the phosphor bronze is that it is non-corrosive, and it is claimed to be equal to steel wire in strength, thus enabling the cables to be made much lighter while virtually imperishable.

A SPLENDID INDUSTRY.—From 160 to 180 hands are now employed at the establishment of Messrs Carrier, Lane & Co., at Levis. The wages of these operatives average from 90 cents to \$2 per day. The firm has more orders on hand than it can attend to for some time to come, and if Mr. Carrier could find them, he would give employment to 200 more mechanics. The present buildings, even with the large addition recently made, are found to be too limited for the requirements of the firm and they have for some time past decided to add another large extension as soon as the bricks and labor can be had at reasonable rates. In a few days, Messrs. Carrier, Lane & Co. expect to have their foundry lighted with the electric light.
