THE CONSTITUTIONAL CON- VENTION.

SACRAMENTO, January 31.—The Convention met at half past nine. Messrs. introduced a resolution requesting the President to appoint a committee of one from each Judicial District, whose duty it shall be to prepare an address to the people of the state, setting forth concisely the principles amendments to the Constitution. Laid on the table.

The Convention proceeded to the consideration of Wilson's amendment providing that no member of the Convention shall be eligible to the office of

Halford Commissioner under the first election. The amendment was rejected—yeas 27 to 83 nocs.

Campbell offered an amendment to section 22, providing that the Commissioners shall have power to establish freight and passenger tariffs, examine books, records, etc.

McFarland offered an amendment simply giving the Commissioners power to examine and report abuses; they let the Legislature in time confer power. Rejected.

This afternoon the Convention resumed consideration of section 22 of the Article on Corporations. The yeas and nocs were demanded on McFarland's amendment and it was lost.

Hager offered a substitute, which the Convention ordered printed. The indications are that Hager's substitute will be adopted.

How the Vote was Taken.
PARIS, January 31.—The voting in Congress for President was secret. The only incidents were the applauding of Victor Hugo and others by the *Left*, as they advanced to the tribunal, and the hooting at Baragou, Broglie, Buffet, and other unpopular members of the Right. Simon and Douber were comparatively unnoticed. There was a perfect frenzy of enthusiasm when the figures were announced. The members of the *Left*, and the public in the galleries rising in a body and repeatedly shouting, "Vive la République!"

Opinion Abroad.
LONDON, January 31.—A dispatch from Berlin represents that no confidence is felt there in President Grévy's competency to maintain his authority.
A Paris dispatch says that at the Cabinet Council on Tuesday morning the ministers offered to resign if President MacMahon thought he could come to a compromise with the Chamber. MacMahon replied with some emotion that he deemed such a step useless.
The tone of the President's letter of resignation seems to meet with general approval.

GERMANY.

Precautions Against the Plague—The New Treaty.
BERLIN, January 31.—The German Government, to prevent the introduction of the plague, has prohibited the importation of all articles prohibited by the Austrian Commission, and also all manufactures of felt. The Imperial Chancellor will draw up regulations relative to traveller's baggage. The Sanitary Commission of the Scheidt quarantine all vessels from the Black Sea.
Bismarck's protectionist tariff will include a duty on English coal of ten per cent ad valorem.

ENGLAND.

Diseased American Cattle at Liverpool.
LIVERPOOL, January 31.—The Privy Council Department has under consideration the subject of the future arrival of cattle from America. Those engaged in the trade contend that unnecessary alarm has been created on the "Ontario" case, and dispute the statement that the animals condemned suffered from pleuro-pneumonia. They have retained veterinary surgeons of high repute to act as a check upon the Privy Council Inspectors.

Strikes in Liverpool.
LONDON, January 31.—The engineers and dockmen at Liverpool and Birkenhead, numbering two thousand, struck to-day.

It is clearly apparent to each, or to determine whether or not such security has not been already taxed in said foreign or other countries; and in the further opinion of your committee the bill would operate, in its legal and financial effect, in an almost total exemption of railroads within this Territory from taxation.

THE Montgomery Advertiser, one of the ablest papers of Alabama, says:

If the Texas Pacific is built it will be competing with the present lines, and if the patriotic and able men in Congress and out, who have the matter in hand, are unable to make the enterprise a truly Southern road, with all the lights before them, then they do not possess the sagacity to which the country has thought them entitled. We believe them equal to the task. The committee report that Tom Scott means to use the Texas Pacific to make a connection with the steel bridge at St. Louis, with the great Eastern monopoly of which he is President, does not seem to be mentioned by the facts. As even so there, he could be needed by his provision for the law. Tom Scott, though President of so many roads, is not all-powerful. Law is superior to Tom Scott. A competing Southern line the country needs and should have, and no doubt will have, in spite of all the Tom Scott schemers who the Huntington machine is busy in constructing and exhibiting.

A LATE dispatch from Washington states that the Postoffice Department has ordered a new postage stamp. It says:

A new stamp is to be used on letters not prepaid. Heretofore a letter being posted and wanting a stamp has been held in the office at which it was mailed. The postmaster at this office then writes to the individual addressed, saying that such a letter has been held in that office for him, the postage not having been prepaid. The new stamp now being issued is intended to be put on the letter not prepaid and sent to the postmaster at the office of its destination, who is charged with the amount due, and to collect the same from the person addressed on the delivery of the letter. A new stamp has also been ordered to be placed on the letter not prepaid by the hands of the carrier, who then becomes responsible for the collection of the postage. This new stamp is intended as a check upon the carrier, who is thereby prevented from pocketing his collections. The new system acts somewhat similar to the late case of the street car conductors.
