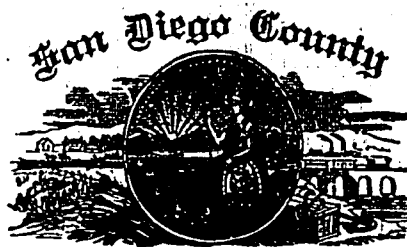

Some of the Advantages of Oceanside.

Oceanside is the finest sea-side resort of the Southwest, and is situated on the line of a transcontinental railroad now almost finished, and at the mouth of the San Luis Rey River, 43 miles from San Diego and 80 miles from San Bernardino, and 3 miles from the attractive old Mission of San Luis Rey.

It is the outlet for a large and productive country, which insures the building up of one of the most prosperous settlements in Southern California.

The beach is composed of clean sand, sloping gradually; the breakers are light, thus affording the finest surf-bathing imaginable, with very little, if any undertow. A beautiful drive of many miles up and down the beach is one of the many features of attraction at our resort.

Another feature that can be added to the amusements of this place is snuff-fishing—with line and reel—in which a considerable amount of sport can be indulged in.

One year ago Oceanside had but two or three houses; to-day she has nearly sixty. Building is still going on, and different classes of business are creeping into the place. Among her places of business are an hotel, livery stable, land office, saloon, stores, restaurant, post, telegraph, express, railroad and newspaper offices.

A system of water works, to supply the town with good, pure water under pressure, is being put in. Good well water can also be obtained at a depth of 63 feet. The artesian well in South Oceanside is down 480 feet and is now in blue clay. The indications are that a flow of water will be struck soon, as the water now rises within 20 feet of the surface.

Live oak wood can be obtained at \$6 per cord and drift wood along the ocean beach at \$1 per cord.

As a health resort, we have the finest climate in the world. During the past summer the thermometer was at no time higher than 78 degrees, in winter freezing point is hardly ever reached.

What Railroads Will Do.

Railroads, it is an acknowledged fact from one extreme of the United States to the other, have done much toward building up and developing the vast resources of our republic. Now let us look at matters in this regard nearer home—our County, her settlements and towns for instance. For thirty years, up to about four years ago, we were totally devoid of connection with the outside world by rail. During those years the hope of "soon" having a railroad nestled always fresh in the minds of the people; and upon that one hope many an old-timer lived in anticipation of the time when he would see our soil, then teeming with herds of cattle and horses, and large bands of sheep lazily grazing in the noonday sun, being plowed by the industrious farmer and the building up of prosperous settlements and happy homes on every hand. These were days of anticipation, and they were well elongated. To-day a very large proportion of old-time expectations have become realized. In the days of the past, and not far back either, one could travel nearly the entire day without meeting a single human, so sparsely settled was the country, but about four years ago ground was broken at San Diego City for the present line of railroad running through the entire width of our County, and from the time of the laying of the first rail to the driving of the last spike which took place only a short time ago, the progress of our County has been remarkable. At the City of San Diego, more particularly during the past year, a new era as it were, has added to her advancement; in fact, San Diego is fast assuming the airs of a very pretty city—the rising city of the great South-west. Outside of the city along the line of the railroad, a number of towns have sprung up, soon to claim their importance in the march of progress. Among these towns are Del Mar, Encinitas, Oceanside, Fallbrook, Temecula, Murietta, Elsinore, Pinesdale and San Jacinto. Thus leaving the railroad and meandering into the interior of the County in all directions

Were we in the position of prosecuting attorney for this County, every effort possible would be used to bring the offenders in this most disgraceful affair to justice, even if the whole power of the County had to be called to assist. Protection to life and property is one of the first principles accorded us in law; but in this County there seems to be no law, simply a one man opinion in criminal matters as it were, and based upon this mode of operation is just what causes the organization of vigilance committees where oftentimes innocent persons are made to suffer for the evil doings of others. The fact is plain to us that this San Jacinto affair has not been looked into as thoroughly as it should have been, for it is indeed a very clear case of riot, and had the facts which we are in possession of been learned, we cannot for the life of us perceive upon what grounds the learned Attorney dismissed the case. We would like to hear from Mr. Hendrick.

We learn that Mr. Nipolite Escaller, the victim of the San Jacinto riot has commenced suit against the County for \$2,000 damages for the unlawful destruction of his property in the late riot. Should Escaller recover damages, which undoubtedly he will, note the manner in which taxpayers will have to suffer for the depredations of a mob which are allowed to roam at large enjoying the same rights and privileges of well-behaved citizens. We expect to see this case show up some astounding facts upon which the Grand Jury will be bound to take notice. This being a civil case the learned Attorney will not be allowed so large a field to work up his dissembling propensities.

It has been so cold of late that we have had a great deal of trouble in getting our newspaper press to run properly, consequently causing delay in the publication of our paper on time. 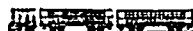
