Jesus Benayas is President of the House of Spain in Balboa Park. He will talk about how California joined the larger world in the mid-18th Century, accompanied by visual presentation. Jesus has presented programs at the San Diego History Center, Save Our Heritage Organisation (SOHO), the Lemon Grove Historical Society, House of Italy, Historical Resource Board, and many more.

A FEW OF OUR PRESIDIO HERITAGE TRUST LECTURE SPEAKERS

Steve Newcomb (Jan 23) is a Shawnee, Lenape scholar and author of *Pagans in the Promised Land: Decoding the Doctrine of Christian Discovery*. He is co-founder and co-director of the Indigenous Law Institute.

Geoffrey Mogilner (Apr 10) is a geologist and has worked in the Old Town historic community for five decades. He has received an AIA orchid award for historic preservation and has published on Cosoy.

Stanley Rodriguez (Apr 24) is an educator, language teacher, and singer of the Santa Ysabel Band of the Iipay Nation.

Ethan Banegas (May 8) is Professor of Kumeyaay Studies and a member of the Barona Band of Mission Indians.

Michael Connolly Miskwish (May 22) author of a number of books on the Kumeyaay and a member of the Campo Kumeyaay Nation, he helped establish in 1990 one of the first tribal U.S. Environmental Protection Agencies.

Chuck Ambers (June 12) is a Professor, and curator of the African Museum *Casa del Rey Moro* in Old Town.

Richard Carrico (Jun 26) SDSU Professor, author, and historian much of his work is from primary documents

Abel Silvas, AKA 'Running Grunion' (Sept 25) is a Native American storyteller, comedian, and teaches performing arts. He is a tribal council member of the Juaneño Mission Band of the Acjachemen Nation.
