Marking the 50th anniversary of the gift of the Gamble House to the University of Southern California, IAC's 18th Annual Arts and Crafts Conference revisits Pasadena, and most significantly, some of the most important domestic architecture of the region.

For the Movement, the most expressive and representative form of architecture is the house, often defined by a set of ideals and principles rather than a single architectural style. Regional distinctions in expression were often significant, as were international influences and the particular gifts and abilities of individual architects and firms, and artists.

To understand the Movement in Pasadena and environs, and its ongoing living expression, we begin with a day of talks, site and collections visits at The Huntington. We also visit major commissions by Greene & Greene among them the Gamble House—Arthur and Alfred Heineman, Frank Lloyd Wright, and R.M. Schindler, and the Pasadena Museum of History, LACMA, and the Maloof Foundation.
