The Santa Fe Railway Station is next??????????


The Santa Fe Railway depot, on Kettner Boulevard at Broadway, has been described as the finest in the State of California. Construction began on June 15, 1914, was finished on December 31, 1914, and formally opened on March 8, 1915. It was designed in "Mission Style" to harmonize with the Spanish-Colonial architecture of the contemporary buildings in Balboa Park.

Historically, the station represents the growth of our city and the prolonged battle for a railroad, a winning battle involving the persevering efforts of every prominent person in San Diego. Completion of the new depot was timed for the opening of the 1915 Panama-California Exposition which commemorated the opening of the Panama Canal, and the new station architecture appropriately resembled that of the Exposition buildings.

The design of the depot is unusual in the treatment of its facilities with the ornamentation characteristics of early California architecture such as the Franciscan Fathers might have applied—and which applications are not particularly compatible with the functional requirements of a railway station. The total blending resulted in the construction of one of the most pleasingly beautiful depots in the United States at that time. The use of color in the tiled domes and in the wainscoting of the waiting rooms is but one of the many outstanding and innovativative features of the attractive building. General Meeting - Sunday, February 27th - 7:30 p.m.

We will meet on the second floor of the historic Sommer Building, 432 F Street, at the northwest corner of 5th Street, one block east of the Off-Broadway Theatre. Off-street parking will be conveniently available at 5th and G or 6th and F Streets. We will be the guests of Mr. Melton Wallack who is currently remodeling this distinctive building and retaining many of its Victorian features which prevailed in the period during which it was originally built.



At this meeting we will hear a report on the status of the Santa Fe Depot proposed dismantling, also learn about future SOHO projects and view slides of prominent early-day structures in San Diego. You will also get a first-hand look at some excellent examples of Victorian architecture in the down-town business area.

Please bring a folding chair or cushion to sit on, since seating accommodations cannot be provided for everyone.

A BUILDING WITH AN ILLUSTRIOUS PAST

The Sommer Building, originally designated the Keating Building, was built in 1890 by the widow of millionaire George J. Keating. It was the first office building in San Diego to use a "modern" style of architecture, getting away from "gingerbread" features of the Victorian era. Its strong, well-studied design, was considered a distinctly modern American style of architecture. The partially circular form of the southwest and southeast corner rooms required window panes of curved glass and ingenious devices to raise the windows. Originally, the building had a "cage elevator" and lighting fixtures providing both gas and electric illumination. (Research Committee of the San Diego Historic Sites Board)

We will meet in a southeast corner room where we can see these unusual windows first-hand. From our meeting place we will also have a view of the nearby Nesmith-Greeley Building and the Ratner Building, both constructed in 1889.
