HORTON HOTEL SAVED!

Since as early as 1974, SOHO has been trying desperately at times, to save the Horton Grand Hotel from demolition. Its fate seemed hopeless. Ernest Hahn was determined to demolish it to make way for yet another parking lot. Then along came Nob Hill Associates, a group from San Francisco oriented toward restoration of historic hotels. They proposed a plan to restore the hotel to a Bed and Breakfast Inn.

On Tuesday, July 28, 1981 the CCDC side of the City Council signed an agreement with Nob Hill Associates to restore and move the historic site. Although we prefer the building to remain on site, once again this compromise shall Save Our Heritage. The Hotel shall be moved to a lot on Island Street facing north between 3rd and 4th Avenue and right next door to the Stingaree Bordello Building.

Nob Hill must completely disassemble the structure first, store the pieces while a skeleton is constructed and reassemble the restored Hotel on the new site. The best part of the deal is—if Hahn doesn't build the center—the hotel can go back on its original site. The building would have to be rebuilt even if it stays on the original site, according to Nob Hill Associates, so perhaps the Horton Grand will just get cleaned up a bit.

But for all intensive purposes, THE HORTON HAS BEEN SAVED!


A report on the Stingaree Bordello's day at the Historical Site Board was presented by MICHAEL SULLIVAN (see story inside).

LIBRARY NEWS

One of the initial steps in the preservation/restoration of a historically significant cultural resource is its listing in the National Register of Historic Places. HOW TO COMPLETE NATIONAL REGISTER FORMS, prepared by the National Register Division of the U.S. Department of Interior, is a detailed guide to aid an owner in nominating a particular piece of property to the National Register. Explanations and examples are given on how to complete individual lines of the nomination forms. Copies of the appropriate titles and public laws are also included. Because each cultural resource is unique, the author has included three differenct nominations (an individual building, an archaeological district, and a historic district) to illustrate what completed forms should look like.

SOHO's library now has the first and second editions of William Seale's, THE TASTEFUL INTERLUDE: AMERICAN INTERIORS THROUGH THE CAMERA'S EYE, 1860-1917. The text includes over 250 photographs of American domestic interiors portraying American customs of interior decoration and living. Mr. Seale provides historical information and analysis for each photograph. The book presents us with a very extensive view of middle-class life in the late 1800's through the design and decoration of American homes.

Chinese Buildings Declared Historic Sites

The San Diego Historic Site Board met on June 2, 1981 to determine the eligibility of San Diego's last four Chinatown structures; the Chinese Benevolent Society, the Ying On Merchants and Labor Association, the Plants and Fireproofing Building, and the Stingaree Bordello.

The Ying On Merchants & Labor Association and Chinese Benevolent Society buildings met with great approval. The Plants and Fireproofing building, however, was not so kindly received. Max Schmidt from CCDC was there to make sure the building was not declared a site. These buildings sit on what is known as the Marina Redevlopment Project. CCDC is interested in possibly moving these structures together and the fewer they are burdened with the the better for them.

Dorothy Hom was on hand to testify to the social significance of all the structures. The real grilling came from members of the board when the Stingaree Bordello came up. Dorothy told of its use as an herb and tea shop. The board seemed more interested in the bordello side of the issue. In fact, the building which stands there today is a reconstruction. The city decided to "clean-up" Chinatown because of the 1915 Exposition and demolished most of it. The reconstruction came after the Expo and was never used as a bordello; thus the controversy. Since this reconstruction was not meeting with overall approval, and I could see it was about to be rejected, I requested a continuance to do more research.

Upon returning home, I immediately called the State Ofice of Historic Preservation and the National Trust for Historic Preservation. In these phone calls I discovered the State office had just completed an Ethnic Survey of Japanese and Chinese structures and this building was unique among those inventoried. The National Trust was surprised to learn that this crib existed, as they were under the impression that the only such buildings remaining were in Telluride, Colorado.

ON JULY 7, 1981, armed with letters from the S.Q.H.P. written to CCDC in May and June of 1979 and the new facts, I returned to the Site Board. This time, however, I took Miles Parker and Carol Lindemulder along. Carol brought evidence that this style of architecture is from the year 200 b.c. and Miles testified to the building's unique aesthetic qualities and before I knew it, the Stingaree was San Diego Historic Site Number 152, Grade 1. The Chinese Benevolent Society, Site Number 150, and the Ying On Merchants & Labor Association Site Number 151. Now 75% of San Diego's remaining Chinese buildings are local historic sites.
