Poes Peritage Parl Faue a poste porter

Heritage Park has been drawing the concern of the press and San Diegans as the park has been losing tenants. There has been much finger-pointing but few constructive suggestions on making the park work. The park has been an experiment of sorts: combining the idea of a public county park with private enterprise. Park location, parking, effective marketing techniques, business management, cooperation by San Diego County and cooperative action among the tenants have all played a part in the current situation of Heritage Park.

On March 31st, the remaining members of the Heritage Park Merchants Association met with SOHO members, county representatives and County Supervisor Leon Williams to exchange ideas on making the park work. SOHO's Heritage Park Task Force presented a written list of the following recommendations:

Immediate needs:

- Parking: an additional 75-100 spaces are needed to accommodate clientele.
- Lighting and security for the additional parking.



 Paving of one side of the cobblestone path for better foot traffic and handicapped access.

Tenants, long-term subleases:

- Tenants and long-term sub-leases are
 essential to the success of the
 park. Sub-leasees with a built-in
 clientele that would generate re <u>turn walk-in trade</u> or offer pro fessional services are recommended.
- Designating the top floors for professional service firms such as architects, lawyers or accountants and leasing the bottom floors to stores that generate walk-in trade is suggested.

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HERITAGE PARK (continued)

- Combine the Sherman-Gilbert and the Bushyhead Houses into a bed-andbreakfast inn. Public access to the foyers would fulfill HUD grant requirements.
- Approval of sub-leasees: the major leasees would form an approval council to insure the quality of the tenants and hopefully reduce turnover.

Community Involvement:

 With the complete restoration of the Temple Beth Israel, the funds generated would contribute to deferring the costs of operating the park. Uses for the Temple can be advertised through County Parks and Recreation publications and by the Heritage Park Merchants Association.

Lights and signs:

 Lights to brighten the exteriors at night and make the park more visible from the freeway and a sign on the hill lit at night are suggested to get recognition for Heritage Park.

As of this April 23rd writing, the county has agreed to look into a marketing study on the park to better as-

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
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certain the kinds of businesses which would both flourish and invite more public participation in the park.



We need to stand back and reconsider the function of Heritage Park. Is it primarily a profit-making venture for San Diego County? Is the park's primary value that of saving historically-valuable structures from demolition and turning them into "old-house" museums for public enjoyment? Is it possible for such restoration efforts to contribute to the profits of private enterprise? Heritage Park's success is important to the idea of the economic viability of historic restoration in that it was originally set up as a kind of showcase for that idea. I feel we cannot let it fail.

Please join us to discuss the Heritage Park question on Saturday morning, May 21st, at 10:30 a.m. on the lawn of Heritage Park. What will happen if all the park's businesses fail? Can the county convert the parkland for other ventures? Does San Diego's Heritage Park really have great potential as a heritage park and a profit-making enterprise? Please bring your ideas and yourselves to this meeting. San Diego needs your input!



MUSEUMS IN THE NEWS

The American Association of Museums will hold its annual meeting in San Diego June 5-9 at the Sheraton Harbor Island Hotel. Delegates will examine the collections and view behind-the-scenes operations at host institutions, as well as tour Old Town State Park, Balboa Park, Villa Montezuma and Hotel Del Coronado. The Association was formed in 1906 to establish and promote standards of excellence for the museum profession. Members include museum employees, trustees and volunteers, and museums of all kinds--from art museums to zoos and historical sites.

SOHO members will also be interested in one of the nation's newest museums, the National Building Museum in Washington, D.C. The museum is a privately funded organization mandated by Congress in 1980 to commemorate and encourage American building arts. The museum is based in the architecturally significant Pension Building, reports the <u>BLUEPRINTS</u> newsletter.

SOHO PRESENTS FIRST ANNUAL HOME PRESERVATION AWARDS MAY 4

A great idea happened on the way to Preservation Week. While conversing with Roger Showley at The San Diego Union about the SOHO Restoration Workshops, he inquired what we were doing for Preservation Week, "...a tour, perhaps?" I responded no, and said, thinking out loud, "Awards are often given to restored buildings where there are lots of federal monies available and to architects who do these edifices, but not to the people themselves out on their own with an old house, with not much to go on except their loving concern."

"Maybe it's time to honor those individuals," I continued, "These are the ones who need encouragement in the midst of endless efforts to achieve their goals."

Mr. Showley responded positively with an offer to give us Sunday coverage in the Union.

So that is how the evolution of our first Home Preservation awards began. With help from Cathy Grigsby, Bruce Herms and Marie Burke Lia, we agreed on a group of homes for judges Pat Schaelchlin, Carol Heepke and Karen Johl to consider.

It was a very special experience for me to talk to the "Restorationists" and hear their varied success and disaster tales. When the final decisions were made, the winners were so pleased with the recognition that I think we all emerged winners. The awards did indeed seem a fitting idea for this year's Preservation Week theme, "Preservation is Housing America." The real icing on the cake was former Senator James Mills' acceptance of Cathy Grigsby's invitation to present the awards.

The awards ceremony will take place at Tiffany's in Heritage Park on Wednesday, May 4, 1983. The evening begins at 6:30 p.m. with a no-host bar, followed by dinner and the awards at 7:00 p.m. The cost of \$9 includes dinner, tax and tip. The three-hour walk will include some of the area's most noteworthy landmarks, starting at the "Giant Dipper" roller coaster, which is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

We will go into some marvelous surprises, like the Victorian (railway?) station moved to the area in 1939, with a mysterious past; the famous Babcock House, by architect Ken Kellogg, and Kellogg's own home built by his father in 1938; visit, too, the first Plunge operator's home (circa 1925), and a charming 1924 cottage built before the Amusement Park; also, a wonderfully-innovative, award-winning town house by Homer Delawie.

National Trust for Historic Preservation

PRESERVATION WEEK 1983 THEME-"HOUSING AMERICA"

The National Trust for Historic Preservation has designated May 8-14 as Preservation Week with the theme "Preservation is Housing America." The purpose of Preservation Week is to increase public awareness of the important role of historic buildings in the prosperity of America's communities. Historic buildings contribute as places to live and work, and can be particularly important in meeting the nation's critical need for affordable housing.


Michael Ainslie, president of the National Trust, explained the selection of housing as the theme of Preservation Week:


"Millions of Americans have realized that preservation and rehabilitation provide an economically feasible solution to the need for housing. The National Trust has shown that rehabilitation is a practical and cost-effective way to provide safe, decent and affordable housing for households of all incomes. The challenge remains to change the attitudes of more housing consumers and producers to accept rehabilitated housing as an alternative to totally new construction."

Approximately 5,000 preservation and neighborhood organizations are expected to hold events during Preservation Week this year. SOHO will hold its first Home Preservation Awards dinner. The 1983 California Historic Preservation Conference will be held May 5-8 at Chapman College in Orange County. California Preservation Foundation is joined this year by the Orange County Board of Supervisors and the Orange County Historical Commission in sponsoring the eighth annual conference.

The theme of this year's conference is "Preservation is Working for America" and reflects the progress being made since new preservation tax laws went into effect, according to the Spring 1983 issue of <u>California Preservation</u>.

SOHO's president Cathy Grigsby will attend the conference as our representative, so expect a report on the proceedings in next month's REFLECTIONS

HISTORY OF NEW SAN DIEGO:

SOHO is proud to include in its membership ELIZABETH MacPHAIL, who wrote her first book, The Story of New San Diego and Alonzo Horton," in 1969, the year SOHO was organized. She is a native San Diegan who first became interested in San Diego's history and politics when she was secretary to Mayor Harry Clark. Her interest in early American history led to involvement in SOHO and preservation, and was instrumental in the beginning of research for her first book.

Elizabeth's early relatives came to San Diego in 1870; her grandmother was a housekeeper for Kate Sessions, San Diego's pioneer horticulturist. Currently, Mrs. MacPhail is working on an article about German-Americans in San Diego from 1850, among the earliest being Louis Rose, Marcus Schiller, and Joseph Mannasse.

SAN DIEGO REVISITED:

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SOHO's first secretary, <u>DENISE</u>
<u>GONZALEZ GREEVER</u>, now a resident of
Placerville, Colorado, was a recent
visitor in San Diego. The lovely
Denise was a board member of the Save
Our Heritage Organisation and spent
many back-breaking hours, working roundthe-clock, on every one of our fundraisers to help save the Sherman-Gilbert House, our first project.

Her efforts aided in preserving the edifice, which eventually made the long journey to Heritage Park. Her sincere dedication to SOHO was deeply appreciated, and we hope someday she will return to San Diego and SOHO. The welcome mat is ready and waiting for our Denise.

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A TREASURE HOUSE OF MEMORIES:

GRACE KLAUBER was born in Chicago and moved to San Diego as a teenager, with her parents, in 1899. She has lived in the same house in Banker's Hill since 1927. At 98 years young, Grace is keenly interested in the future of San Diego's Centre City. "San Diego had 17,000 people when we came here; there's been quite a change," she said.


The name Klauber has become synonymous with historic preservation. Klauber-Wangenheim (K-W) was the wholesale grocery firm founded by her husband's family in 1869. The K-W building at 6th and Island is now a warehouse. At one time, a developer had planned to turn it into a film stage, but now it is a ministorage facility until higher uses can be justified. LIBRARY HISTORY BOOK ANNOUNCED

San Diego history buffs will be interested in a new book entitled <u>Turning the Pages: San Diego Public Library History 1882-1982</u>, by Clara E. Breed. Slated for publication in late spring 1983, the book details the growth and development of San Diego's public library from a subscription library to computers.

The author was City Librarian for 25 years and a member of the library staff for 42 years. The book will be approximately 250 pages in length, with 20 pages of photographs. All proceeds from the sale of the new publication will go to the Library Education Fund, established in 1954 "to promote the use of the Library and the stimulation of community interest in and knowledge of its services."
