THOUSANDS TO ATTEND "CONFERENCE WITHOUT WALLS" IN WASHINGTON, DC-OCT 7-11

The nation's capital will be the focus of an innovative "conference without walls" this fall when the 41st National Preservation Conference is sponsored by the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

This pioneering conference format is designed to make attendees active participants by getting them out of the meeting rooms and into the streets to explore critical issues and experience both famous and little-known sites. The conference theme, "Landmarks of Democracy," is well suited to utilize the city of Washington as a laboratory for field study.

More than 2,500 professionals and activists in preservation and related fields will attend, including architects, planners, investors, developers, historic site administrators, public officials, educators, and more. The conference and trade show will be based at the Washington Hilton Hotel.

Forty-five different conference sessions will examine such topics as:

#### Landmarks of Democracy

Historic Residences in Private Ownership

Rounding out the conference will be Rehabitat, the annual trade show, local and regional tours, and special events. Conference registration is open to Trust members and nonmembers. Information on registration can be obtained from the conference promotional material or by calling (202) 673-4100.

#### NATIONAL NEWS

The Advisory council on Historic Preservation has asked the Secretary of the Interior to reevaluate his Historic Preservation Fund zero budget recommendation of the past seven years. Following discussion initiated by Trust president J. Jackson Walter and upon a motion by National Conference of State Historic Preservation Officers (NCSHPO) president F. Lawrence Oaks, the Council voted unanimously-with the Interior Dept. representative abstaining-to request the reconsideration prior to submission of Interior's fiscal year 1989 appropriations recommendation for state programs and the Trust. The vote, which occurred at the Council's June 22 meeting in Washington, is especially significant in light of the council's membership. The 19 members include the heads of seven federal agencies, presidentially appointed preservation experts and members of the general public, in addition to the Trust and NCSHPO.

SAN DIEGO, A PICTORIAL HISTORY



Water was always a problem in San Diego. At first, there were wells and water carts, but if the town was going to amount to much, a larger, more dependable and more convenient water supply would have to be secured. In the 1880's the first large steps in that direction were taken with the construction of a dam on Boulder Creek in the Cuyamaca Mountains and a 45-mile flume to carry the water to town.



REHAB RIGHT How To Realize The Full Value of Your Old House

Many SOHO members probably know all about this invaluable handbook on old-house rehabilitation. For those of you unfamiliar with this gem of a volume, you are in for a treat. The author, Helaine Kaplan Prentice, is an associate planner for the City of Oakland Planning Department. She first produced the book as a city publication, in 1978, to help residents carefully maintain their old homes. Rehab Right turned out to be such a resource that it became a "best seller."

Almost ten years later, Berkeley's Ten Speed Press printed a new and improved version. SOHO's office received a postcard announcing this long awaited news and informing us that SOHO is featured in the revised book. According to Kay Kaiser, architectural critic for the San Diego Union, Rehab Right is the guide "for people ready to start ripping up their homes. It outlines, illustrates and demystifies the basics, but it touches on deeper design philosophy as well."

Kaiser elaborates upon the link between the knowledge of good design in one's home and and the development of well-built, well-designed cities.

"People connect with their houses. Old people dream of the houses they were born in. A tripartite molding in a restored Victorian can suddenly bring back memories of Grandma's house. The time spent removing eight layers of paint from a brass light fixture makes a room yours.

Once people appreciate good detail in their homes, they will demand it elsewhere-everywhere.

This is how great neighborhoods and cities are built."

SOHO couldn't agree more.

BED & BREAKFAST SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA Automobile Club of Southern California

This new bed and breakfast book from the Automobile Club of Southern California is designed for travelers who enjoy the atmosphere and hospitality of a bed and breakfast visit.

The book indicates that a wide variety of B&B's exist in Southern California, and it does mention in its listings if a home is old or of more recent vintage. Indeed, many of the homes listed are original Victorian or Craftsman houses complete with antiques and atmosphere.

The book is quite thorough and contains an introduction that includes general information on the B&B experience and how to make reservations. Prior to the listings, a map of B&B locations in Southern California is furnished. The book also includes a list of Reservation and Referral Agencies and an Index. The cost of this slim volume is nominal, only one dollar. Unfortunately, it is a members only publication.

#### OLD HOUSE JOURNAL

VICTORIAN EXTERIOR DECORATION by Roger Moss and Gail Caskey Winkler

This book introduces the layman (most of us) to the relationships between the colors of the first Victorians and those on the market today. The authors provide the reader with guides and criteria for choosing exterior color for a Victorian style house.

As a historically accurate reference book on Victorian decor, Victorian Exterior Decoration is resplendent with old plates from the Athenaeum of Philadelphia, a private, 19th century historical library on Washington Square. These plates demonstrate how the colorists of the past treated exterior ornamentation, frieze panels, brackets, dentils and bargeboards, to a lively, colorful paint job.

This is a most beautiful and useful book, and for those house owners looking to change their white "safe" color schemes, a definite resource.



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
