


Tour Irving Gill's First Church of Christ Scientist with SOHO on March 1

ON MARCH 1, SOHO WILL PRESENT AN OPPORTUNITY TO EXPERIENCE a guided tour of the First Church of Christ Scientist, almost fully restored to it's original design, and see it as Gill designed it for the first time in almost half a century. This 1909/1910 monumental structure in Gill's classic Modern Mission Style had been cloaked by a mid-century "modern" remodel, and shorn of it's monolithic tower. The congregation has chosen to return this famous building to its original design form, to the benefit of all.

More than just a preview of one of the most important restorations our area has ever seen, this SOHO tour and program will take participants into the design and reconstruction process as the project nears completion. Jim Kelly-Markham, of Bokal Kelly-Markham, the restoration architect/historian, and planner Kathleen Kelly-Markham will lead us through the decision-making process and detail the excitement of uncovering the original design, color and building fabric in a "lost" landmark.

SOHO will have two tours, at 10:00 A.M. and 2:00 P.M and space is limited. This program will be in a very personal setting in a building still under reconstruction, and presentations will be by principals in the research and design process.

Planning Committee to meet February 8 for Binational Commemoration of the 300th Anniversary of the Loreto Mission, Baja California Sur

In the spring of 1996, the State of California Parks and Recreation Department and Mexico's INAH (Institute for Anthropology and History) signed an agreement to work together to tell the story of the El Camino Real/Missionero Transportation Corridor. One step in this partnership could be the commemoration of the 300th Anniversary of the founding of the Loreto Mission in Loreto, Baja California Sur. Toward this end, all groups or individuals interested in planning, participating in, or attending an event or ceremony in October 1997 (date to be announced) for the San Diego/Tijuana region to mark the 300th Anniversary of the Loreto Mission are invited to attend the planning meeting.

The meeting will be at the San Diego Mission de Alcala, 10818 San Diego Mission Road, St. Francis Center (California Room) on Saturday, February 8, from 9:30 to 11:30 A.M.

Representing the State of California will be John Foster, Senior State Archaeologist in Sacramento. Representing Baja California will be Julia Bendimez, Director of INAH in Mexicali. Representatives from five San Diego Kumeyaay tribes have also been invited to the meeting.

Ideas for a commemoration range from a simple social reception to a full weekend event with speakers, panels, workshops, music and dance. Come help decide.

Ballast Point Chinese Fishing Camp Discovery to be Commemorated on February 15

THE 1991 DISCOVERY OF A rare Chinese barber's plate under the 1890 foundations of the Ballast Point lighthouse provides a unique window on the past to be spotlighted at the Ballast Point Asian Heritage Symposium on Saturday, February 15, presented by the Fort Guijarros Museum Foundation. This educational event will feature slide lectures, exhibits, a buffet and no-host bar. Four slide lectures will present a historic context for the Asian immigrant experience in San Diego.

Believed to be the oldest Asian settlement in San Diego, the Ballast Point Chinese joined the Packard Whaling Company sometime between 1858 and 1886. Tax collectors recorded Chinese families at this remote outpost in 1863. The 1870 U.S. Census list "Ah Low, 40 years of age, cook" among the crew of the Packard Whaling Company.

Fort Guijarros Museum
Foundation archaeologists,
working with U.S. Navy Sea
Bees volunteers, uncovered
broken porcelain bowls and
spoons, soy sauce pots and
vegetable jars along with the
barber's plate and other
1860s vintage artifacts. The
U.S. Navy issued an excavation permit for the scientific
study and approved the project.

Commemoration of the discoveries will be celebrated at the Ballast Point Asian Heritage Symposium to be held at the Harbor Inn, U.S. Navy Submarine Base, San Diego, from 4:00 to 7:00 P.M. Guests will be present for the unveiling of a new watercolor painting interpretation of the Ballast Point

Chinese Fishing Camp by fine artist Jay Wegter.

Three speakers will address the historical context of early Asian people in San Diego in the 19th century

•Professor Judith Liu,
Ph.D., University of San
Diego, will deliver a lecture
on the early history of
Chinese immigrants. Dr. Liu
conducted extensive
research in the U.S.
National Archives and is
currently active with the
Chinese Historical Society of
San Diego and Baja California.



•Archaeologist Roberta
Greenwood, famous for discoveries in the Los Angeles
Chinatown under the
Metrorail, will deliver a
slide lecture on other
archaeological finds in
California and the
Southwest. Greenwood is
author of a new book in
press on the Los Angeles
Chinatown and has also
worked in Ventura.

•Architect M. Wayne
Donaldson will present a
lecture on the built environment of Asian immigrants in
California. Known for many
significant historic preservation projects in San Diego,
Donaldson was instrumental
in developing the Pan Asian
Thematic Historic District in
the San Diego Gaslamp
Quarter.

Archaeologist Ronald V. May directed the 1991 investigations of the Ballast Point whaling station and Chinese fishing camp and was knighted by the Spanish government for the discovery of the 18th century Fort Guijarros. May will deliver a slide lecture on how the earliest Asian settlement in San Diego was discovered among the whale bones, harpoons, and tryworks ovens.

Forensic archaeologists sifted cut hair fragments from the soil near the barber's plate. These hairs were identified by County Sheriff's Crime Lab as cut and caucasian. The tiny artifacts proved the Chinese operated a barbershop for the Euro-American whalers.

Other clues of Chinese industry sifted from the sands included thousands of large pismo clam shells, fish bones, and saw cut abalone shell. Analysis revealed the fish primarily to have been deep water rook fish, a winter season catch. The pismo probably were harvested from Imperial Beach and shipped to Ballast Point.

Hundreds of saw-cut abalone and wavy-top snail shells are evidence of an extensive marine shell industry along the Pacific Coast. The mother-of-pearl shell could be sold in Southeast Asia for jewelry and furniture ornament manufacture.

Yet another interesting discovery was hundreds of tiny limpets found only on Feather Boa kelp. The kelp had been harvested, dried on racks, and shipped to China for specialty foods.

PRESERVATION ALERT: Fort Rosecrans National Register District Faces Demolition

SOHO HAS LEARNED THAT THE FORT Rosecrans National Register Historic District Officers Row has been condemned as a result of major changes in the U.S. Navy command in San Diego. Admiral Joseph Walker, Command Naval Base, authorized demolition of the Fort Rosecrans National Historic District Officers Row and construction of high density Navy housing on Point Loma. Fort Rosecrans is California Historic Landmark #66, approved by "Colonel Douglas MacArthur."

This authorization to demolish major buildings in the Fort Rosecrans National Register Historic District stems from foundation cracks in one of the buildings (the cracks date back to 1943). The other threatened structures have no such cracks but are still listed for demolition.

The threatened 1904 Colonial Revival structures form the heart of the 1889 to 1962 U.S. Army Fort Rosecrans. The two blocks featuring barracks, hospital, bakery, storehouses, YMCA recreational building, and four officers duplexes may prove to be the most significant military architecture south of the Presidio at San Francisco. All of the building have been exquisitely maintained by the U.S. Navy Submarine Base for the past 35 years.

The "problem" that triggered the Navy plans for demolition is a landslide on Rosecrans Street north of Anne's Alley. This landslide had been weakened by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers construction in 1942, which caused slumping at the northern house. Portions of the basement granite foundations cracked in 1943 and have remained that way ever since. None of the other three duplexes exhibit foundation cracking, since none of these are within the landslide area. A U.S. Navy structural engineer evaluated the crack in the granite foundation and declared the entire Fort Rosecrans National Historic District to be unsafe! This engineer did not consult a geologist or review the landslide history in relation to the foundation cracks.

The most beautiful portion of the Fort Rosecrans National Register Historic District is this block of two-story duplexes forming Officers Row. They are part of a wonderful neighborhood of well maintained lawns, lush Canary island palm trees, tall eucalyptus and Monterey cypress trees, and silk oak trees. Painted in light tan with dark brown enamel trim, these officers' structures exhibit ornate gable and window details. Each duplex has Greco-Roman fireplace/mantle elements, pocket doors, built-in glassed china cabinets, ornate tin ceilings and carved bannistered staircases. Steward's staircases access the kitchen and full basement. All the houses have blue granite foundations, said to have been quarried in the San Francisco area. The destruction of such historic buildings on such a flimsy pretext is inexcusable.

The Advisory Council on Historic Preservation has put the U.S. Navy on warning that plans to demolish the Fort Rosecrans district for new Navy housing is a federal undertaking subject to the National Historic Preservation Act. A Section 106 review by the California State Historic Preservation Officer and Advisory Council on Historic Preservation will be required for the Navy to carry out its demolition plans. Also, several civilian historic architects have advised the U.S. Navy that the structural engineer is wrong. There are inexpensive architectural solutions to repair the foundation cracks and eliminate damage from future landslide action. These recommendation have been totally ignored by the U.S. Navy.

We're asking SOHO members to help by the power of the pen. There is still time of change Admiral Walker's order to demolish the 1904 Officers Row. Write in support of maintaining the Fort Rosecrans Historic District to:

Class in San Diego History Offered at Landmark San Diego Schoolhouse

Do you really want to know why Alonzo Horton chose to develop San Diego in 1867? Or perhaps you would like to know what it's like living in a house built more than a hundred years ago for an enigmatic spiritualist? Maybe you'd like to learn the difference between a Mission Revival and a Spanish Colonial Revival bungalow in San Diego's historic "streetcar suburbs"?

Starting February 5, SOHO member and former boardmember Alexander D. Bevil will be offering a class in the history of San Diego. An award-winning local historian and preservationist, Mr. Bevil will focus on the development of modern San Diego from the initial development of Horton's Addition to sprawling postwar Sunbelt suburbia. Along the way he'll highlight San Diego architectural heritage, from Victorian Mansions to rambling California bungalows.

The class will be held in the historic Mason Street Schoolhouse on Wednesdays, between 7:00 and 9:00 P.M., from February 5 to June 11. Built in 1866, the historic school building is just west of the plaza (between San Diego Avenue and Congress Street) in Old Town San Diego State Historic Park. Some interesting guest speakers will stop by, and there will be some weekend tours of noted historical landmarks offered.

Adam and Caroline Beaty House, La Chiquita, to be Preserved in Alpine

Landowner Katherine Jenney and D.K. Wind, Inc. have proposed to preserve the 1889 Adam and Caroline Beaty House of Alpine. Known for the past two decades as La Chiquita in Beatrice LaForce's book on Alpine history, the Beaty farmhouse has been preserved as a guest house on the Jenney ranch in recent years.

Jenney and D.K. Wind submitted a tentative map for a 34-lot subdivision on 88 acres east of Tavern Toad in early 1996. The application included a historical report by Richard Carrico on the history of La Chiquita, which proved to be the Beaty House. This is also the oldest known house in Alpine, Beaty had raised been in Harbison Canyon, served on community boards, and was a prominent agriculturalist in the late 19th century.

The Beaty House is a western adaptation of eastern architectural styles. Elements of the windows were salvaged from a pre-1870s building and reused in the

1889 construction. Situated on a rock and post foundation, the two-story house once exhibited ornate porch brackets. (Those brackets remain under the crawl space of the house.)

Historian and building contractor Albert Simondson believes the Beaty House can be restored to its original appearance with little effort. Modern add-on bedrooms and a bathroom need to be removed from the North porch, aluminum windows need to be removed and replaced with wood windows, and minor detail work would restore the house to its former glory. The house is located adjacent to a beautiful Oak Riparian Woodland and wetland stream. •
