

Urgent Preservation Fight: Save the Hotel del Coronado

CORONADO CITY COUNCIL TO VOTE ON ALLOWING GROSS "IMPROVEMENTS" TO THE HISTORIC DEL.


CAN THIS BE FOR REAL? NORTH, SOUTH, EAST AND WEST VIEWS TO be blocked, pioneering historic electric power plant, original and subsequent brick laundries, garage/stables, original Kate Sessions plantings and prehistoric archeological deposits to be

destroyed. Yes, this danger is very real.

The Hotel Del Coronado, arguably the most important historic building in the San Diego region from a national and international point of view, faces what is the most devastating threat to historic preservation in San Diego history. The Travelers Group, new owners of this gracious hotel, argue that they must make the Del attractive for conventions and the like into the next century by expanding on the existing structures and removing some historic "outdated" ones. Of course, the fault in this thinking is that they will be destroying the very ambiance that people come to the Del to experi-

We wish we were kidding or exaggerating to get the attention of those who think "they" could never let the Del literally disappear from view. We're not. If the City Council of Coronado approves this plan (at press time, most of the councilmembers were in favor of this expansion), the Del will become caged in the center of "improvements" that will remove it from association with the town it's named after.

The Hotel del Coronado was just listed as one of the 500 most important buildings ever built in the United States from the 10th Century to the present in a new book by noted architect/author G.E. Kidder Smith. Currently the Del is a National Historic Landmark, a California State Historic Landmark, on the National Register of Historic Places, part of the National Trust for Historic Preservation's Historic Hotels of America program, and is also on the Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS). Because of this proposed alteration, the National Park Service Western Regional Office has recommended the Del to their most endangered list. And if this "boxing" of the Del happens, the site will probably lose its National Register standing. The owners don't seem to mind.



The new specific plan for the Del has been released and copies are on public view at the Coronado Public Library and at the Coronado Community Development Department at 1825 Strand Way in Coronado. The plan calls for destruction of the original brick powerplant and laundry complex that was the largest electric plant of its kind in the world when installed in 1887-1888. This plant provided electric power for the entire island of Coronado until the late 1920s. The Del's owners propose replacing it with a new convention center, parking structures, and new hotel rooms extending along the south side of the hotel from Orange Avenue to the ocean, with heights ranging from 40 to 80 feet high.

Along the ocean side, covering the entire oceanfront and replacing the tennis courts, the plan calls for new hotel rooms and restaurants at a height of 40 feet with 60 foot towers. On the north side, the plan stipulates a new hotel block with a parking structure. This block will also be 40 feet high with 60 foot towers and will cover the entire north view. Completing the circle around the northeast corner and east up to the Grand Hall, which was built in recent years, will be a new commercial strip mall complex also calling for 40 foot heights.

What will be the result of these additions? Because the new buildings will be within 50 feet of the foundation of the hotel, no one will be able to see the historic Hotel del Coronado from looking up the strand, looking down the beach, from the ocean or from the town! (CON'D ON P. 2)

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

An audible gasp passed through the audience at the Pasadena Playhouse.

No, it wasn't a risque comedy or a suspenseful drama, but rather the notice to the plenary session of the 22nd Annual California Preservation Conference of plans to wall off our own Hotel del Coronado.

The Conference allows groups to gather who intuitively know what it means when someone says "cottage cheese belongs on the table, not on the ceiling." There, "three minute success stories" allow us to let down our hair, celebrate our heroes and boo and hiss the villains.

As someone who has been accused of being the George M. Cohen of San Diego preservation (my birthday is during National Historic Preservation Week), perhaps I may be forgiven my enthusiasm, but it is nice to be in a crowd of preservationists.

We learn when the world has caught up with us (courts have ruled that a plaque is no replacement for a historic building) and we learn what we need to catch up with, such as the Historic Homeownership Assistance Act and the reauthorization of ISTEA (with "enhancements" such as the financed Historic National City Depot), both now in Congress.

But the enjoyment of community is the most important to me, so sing along: "...with a burger here, a french fry there, here a shake, there a shake, everywhere a shake shake, the oldest McDonald's is in Downey, EI-EI-O." Hope many of us can join together in Sante Fe in October with the National Conference.

CPF Conference Focuses on Strategies for Preserving Neighborhoods

HOTEL DEL CORONADO (CON'D)


All this planned building will require the removal of many of the original large specimen plantings that were originally in the lawn that extended from the verandas of the hotel to the village of Coronado. The plantings were left in place and paved around when this area was converted into a parking lot

SOHO has also been informed of a plan to paint the original varnished woodwork in the lobby and Crown Room. The crown-shaped chandeliers are alleged to be removed as well. The architects of this new plan have stated that the new buildings will emulate the "Bahamas Cays architecture of the area." This statement, asserting that the Del needs to emulate some place in the Caribbean (when there's a hotel at Walt Disney World, so close to the Caribbean, that emulates the Hotel del), is outrageous. This position, together with the destructive new plans, shows that the owners have no understanding of what they possess. They have a complete disregard for this most magnificent historic structure and the importance it has for Coronado, the San Diego region, the nation and the world.

We need everyone's help. The Coronado City Council may actually vote approval of this plan. We must urge that to reject it. Please call the councilmembers, write letters to the editors of San Diego and Coronado newspapers, call talk radio, contact television stations, ask to meet with Coronado City Council members to voice your concerns. We can't allow the Coronado City Council to believe silence is consent. This is a preservation battle that our region can't afford to lose.

Updates to this plan for the Hotel del Coronado are presented every third Tuesday of each month at 3:00 P.M. in the Coronado City Council chambers, located at 1825 Strand Way in Coronado. Please attend the council sessions or write to the city council members to voice your opinion that messing with the Del will not only be bad for historic preservation, but will be bad for business also. What kind of a Garden goes with My Old House? This question is often asked, but there's little information available on the "how-to's" of historic garden design in California. Get the answers to hopefully most of your questions at the SOHO Historic Gardens Workshop.

avoid the garden restoration errors that our workshop leaders have made.

Update: Status of the Navy's Historic Officers' Row Housing

IN THE FEBRUARY ISSUE OF Reflections we reported that the Officers' Row housing was endangered and being considered for demolition. This prompted SOHO and Reflections readers to act. Steade Craigo of the State Historic Preservation Office and Bruce Coons of SOHO toured the site with architect Wayne Donaldson on April 22. A Navy general admitted that there was a demolition plan and that the fallback plan was to move the historic houses and create a "historic" district elsewhere.

Now, due to pressure from SOHO and other preservation groups, the structures are going to be repaired and restored with the help of Wayne Donaldson.

On May 28, 1997 the City of San Diego's Historical Sites Board heard an update from architect Donaldson on the current status of Officers' Row. (Although the Sites Board has no jurisdiction over this federally-owned property, Wayne presented the progress as an information item.)

The houses face the bay and are on a road know as Anne's Alley, which runs behind the houses. In 1936 all 47 buildings were declared to be a California Historic Landmark. The houses are in very good condition, with the exception of some settling and cracks in

the foundations and slabs, which are now being repaired. Any repairs that are believed necessary will be done using appropriate materials. The Navy is focusing on stabilizing and repairing the exteriors at this time.

SOHO is continuing to monitor this project and has received plans from the Navy for review. SOHO applauds the Navy for its appropriate change in direction and it's planned restoration of these historically important homes. We will keep you posted on the Navy's progress with the restoration.

Thanks to all those who wrote to support restoration over demolition. We can never emphasize enough how powerful your letters of protest are in turning around opinion toward preservation.

THE "ARTIST AWARD"

To the CHICANO PARK STEERING COMMITTEE and GARY GALLEGOS of CALTRANS for their efforts to preserve intact the Chicano Park Murals while providing needed seismic retrofitting to the San Diego-Coronado Bay Bridge. the community, through the Chicano Park Steering Committee, insisted that the murals be preserved from defacement, and CALTRANS responded creatively to the challenge and found a solution.

THE "HISTORIC RESTORATION AWARD" TO THE MARSTON HOUSE RESTORATION

If YOU HAVE RESTORED OR REHABILITATED AN older house within the past five years, consider entering the 1998 Great American Home Awards contest, sponsored by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. In its ninth year, the Home Awards is the national contest that specifically recognizes outstanding achievements in home rehabilitation across the country.

Categories include Exterior Rehabilitation, Interior Rehabilitation, Sympathetic Addition, and Landscape, plus a special category for Bed & Breakfasts. To be eligible, houses must be at least 50 years old and must have been designed and still be serving as single-family homes or bed & breakfasts. The entry deadline is September 30, 1997.

This PIP Award is specifically for the Foundation's unwavering effort to get the Balboa Theatre listed on the National Register of Historic Places, an important step towards the Balboa's long-sought restoration and reopening as a live theatre.

THE "NEXT CENTURY" AWARD To the OLD TOWN IMMACU-LATE CONCEPTION CHURCH in Old Town San Diego for the excellent seismic retrofit, readying the building for the next century through the use of non-invasive high technology methods. The project's designers, McCall-Smith Design and Luth & Turney, Inc., used their technological know-how and historic sensitivity show everyone that a seismic retrofit of historic buildings does not require destruction.



THE "KEEPER OF THE FLAME" AWARD

THE "EDUCATION AWARD"




SOHO Annual Meeting Moved to Sept.15
